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

Entries close at Noon Saturday July 12th, No Late Entries Accepted. Ways to make Entries:

- Complete the entry form in this book and bring it into the fair office during the above times to make/pay for your entries in person.
- Mail the completed entry form to: Wood County Agricultural Society, P.O. Box 146, Bowling Green, Ohio 43402.

No one shall make more than 2 entries in any classification unless specified in the rules for individual departments.

All entry fees, pen fees, Membership—Exhibitor fees \$30.00 must be paid at the time of making entry. Lost Membership or exhibitor tickets will not be replaced. No refunds given. No pens or stalls reserved unless all fees are paid with entries. PREMIUMS (except Livestock Sale) issued for the 2025 Fair can be picked up at the Fair Office August 4th from 5:00 pm- 7:00 pm. Premium checks must be picked up at the Fair Office within 60 days of the close of the fair. NO PREMIUMS WILL BE MAILED. All premiums not collected within 60 days will be considered donations to the Ag. Society.

COMPETITION FOR PREMIUMS

Competition is open to all residents of any county which extends the same courtesy to all residents of Wood County, unless stated otherwise in rules of the department concerned, and who conform to all bylaws, rules and regulations of the Wood County Agricultural Society and of the Ohio Department of Agriculture.

Any resident of Wood County 18 years old or over, desiring to compete for class premiums must first have or purchase a Membership or Exhibitor ticket. Those under 18 may enter under their parents Membership or Exhibitor Ticket or buy their own Exhibitor ticket. Any person not a resident of Wood County, in order to compete for premiums, must first purchase an Exhibitor Ticket.

Children under age 18 may exhibit under their parent or guardian's membership/ exhibitor ticket number or they may purchase a youth exhibitor pass for \$3.50.

All animals and articles shown must be owned by the exhibitors. All farm and garden products must have been raised by exhibitor. All home manufactured articles must have been made by exhibitor. Organizations of Wood County may compete for prizes without regard to the membership rule, in the competitions provided for organizations. No one shall make more than two entries in any classification.

An animal must be shown to collect premiums. No animal or article shall be entered to compete for more than one premium except as follows: an animal may be shown individually and also as one of a pair or a herd.

Junior Fair exhibits may be entered in the open departments if the rules and regulations of such departments are fulfilled, as well as meeting all general rules and regulations, including membership. Livestock entries are subject to the Livestock Health Regulations, which are contained in this book.

Articles and animals entered contrary to regulations will forfeit their right to receive premiums unless corrections can be made before the judging is to be done.

No person shall see the entry list or be informed of the kind or the number of entries except the proper officials until entries has been closed. No pens or stalls reserved unless all fees are paid with entry. No entry or pen fees will be refunded. Any person acting in a manner unbecoming an exhibitor shall, upon action of the fair board, be barred from showing at the fair indefinitely.

ENTRY TAGS

Pick up entry tags at the time of making entries in person. If entries are made online or through the mail, tags will be held for exhibitors to pick up at the Fair Office. No entry tags will be mailed. Membership tickets cannot be mailed. They must be picked up in person. Entry tags must be submitted to the Superintendent of the department and must remain with the animal or article when placed on exhibit throughout the Fair.

PLACING OF EXHIBITS

All exhibitors are to place their exhibits in position as directed by rules of each department. Commercial exhibitors may do preliminary work on their exhibit space on Friday and Saturday before the fair.

CARE OF EXHIBITS

Security protection will be provided, night and day, at the fairgrounds from Sunday 8 a.m. before the fair until Monday, 8 a.m. (Day after the fair).

The Fair Board and the Sheriff's Deputies will take every reasonable precaution for the preservation and safekeeping of all exhibits but will not be responsible for any loss or damage which may occur.

All exhibitors are to cooperate in giving attention, care and protection not only to their own exhibits, but also to any and all property on the Fairgrounds at all times, and furthermore to report promptly to the Sheriff's Deputies and Fair officers any situation they notice to be in need of attention.

Exhibitors of livestock must furnish their own straw, feed, feedboxes, troughs, and buckets.

Livestock exhibitors must keep the aisles free and clean from 9 a.m. to 11 p.m. daily.

Exhibitors are liable for any and all damage to persons or property caused by their exhibits or by themselves. Care should be taken to avoid accidents.

PAYMENT OF PREMIUMS

Premiums shall be picked up by exhibitors from Fair Office unless there is some question regarding premium payment.

Sale checks will be available on or before October 1, 2025. Request for a lost or stale check to be replaced will have \$10.00 (ten dollars) deducted from the original check.

All claims for premiums must be settled by October 1 and all premium checks & livestock sale checks are void after 30 days. Exhibitors removing exhibits before stipulated time or otherwise fails to comply with all regulations forfeit their premiums.

REMOVAL OF EXHIBITS DATES & TIMES

Exhibits released only to the owners or their representatives.

No livestock exhibits shall be removed from the place of exhibition starts one half hour after grandstand acts Sun., Aug. 3rd except for urgent cause approved by the superintendent and two other officers of the Board unless the department rules state otherwise. Premiums will not be issued to any exhibitor not adhering to release times and exhibitor can be denied exhibitor rights indefinitely.

Use of alcoholic beverages on grounds will result in removal of exhibit and forfeit of premiums.

All exhibits should be removed as soon as possible after the time set for removal. Exhibits in rented tents must be removed by 10:00 a.m. Monday, August 5th.

The fair board reserves the right to change the hours and dates for removal of exhibits should conditions warrant such action.

JUDGING AND AWARDS

The single judge system will be used insofar as possible.

No one shall act as judge in any department if directly interested in any exhibit or if closely related to an exhibitor.

Objections to any person serving as judge must be made in writing to the superintendent in charge, before any awards are announced; and the superintendent, with the aid of his assistants, shall have power to act on such objections.

Exhibitors shall not in any way interfere with judges or judging; shall not display trophies of any kind until after judging is completed and the results have been announced for that department.

No premium shall be awarded for an animal or article deemed unworthy, even if there be no competition; nor to an exhibit not properly entered or classified.

If there is any question regarding the regularity of an entry or the right of entry to compete, the judge shall refer the matter to the superintendent of the department for decisions

Any known attempts to influence or abuse a judge by an exhibitor will be considered just cause for not awarding premiums to the exhibitor. Judges shall consider size, form and symmetry, age and maturity, and such other qualities as are usually noted in judging that particular type of exhibit.

Showmanship should be given consideration in some instances.

Judges' decisions shall be recorded on an official Judges' Report which shall be filed with the Secretary immediately after judging.

Not more than two awards shall be made in any single competition to the same exhibitor.





2025 WOOD COUNTY FAIR FLOWER SHOW RULES

- Each show will be judged by accredited OAGC judges according to the OAGC standards system.
- 2. The decision of the judges will be final.
- Any exhibitor, over 17 years old, to compete for class premiums, must have a membership or exhibitor ticket. Exhibitors under 17 may enter under a parent's membership or purchase a youth exhibitor's ticket.
- All classes open to those who grow flowers and plants for pleasure only, not for the purpose of livelihood.
- The exhibitor must grow all horticulture entries. Correct variety name(s) should be on the entry tag.
- Plant material used in artistic designs must be listed on a separate 3" x 5" card displayed with the entry.
- 7. Plant material may be obtained from any source for use in arrangements.
- 8. No artificial plant material will be permitted.
- Fresh plant material may not be artificially colored, painted, treated or dyed.
- 10. Fresh plant material must be predominating in all traditional designs.

- Plant materials on the conservation list may not be used unless grown by the exhibitor, which must be stated on the card accompanying the design.
- 12. Foliage is permitted unless otherwise stated.
- 13. Dried plant material may be natural, colored or painted.
- When the horticulture schedule calls for a definite number, a greater or lesser number disqualifies.
- 15. In Division A, the plant must have been in the exhibitor's possession at least three (3) months.
- 16. Houseplants entered in the first show may be entered in the second show under a different class. .
- 17. A person may enter only one exhibit under each artistic class.
- 18. In the horticulture section more than one entry will be permitted for each different named variety. Variety name must be included on entry tag. Premiums will not be paid for more than two exhibits per class.
- 19. No scenes or landscapes will be accepted.
- Entries must not be moved or position altered without assistance of the Placement Committee.
- 21. Exhibitors must replace plant material for all designs as needed to assure freshness of the design for the duration of the show. Do not change the design.
- 22. No advanced designers permitted in classes 111 and 112. Designers who have won 1st place on more than two invitationals in the previous two years, floral judges, recent John Moore Award recipients are considered advanced designers.
- 23. No exhibitors permitted in the show area during judging.
- Containers, bases, and accessories should be marked on the bottom, with exhibitor's name, and info.
- 25. While the Flower Show Committee will afford the best possible care and protection to all exhibits, it distinctly disclaims any liability for losses or damage to exhibits or personal property of the exhibitors.
- 26. Any entry removed before the guidelines set forth above will forfeit all monetary premium(s) won by the exhibitor in both the first and second shows.
- 27. BEST OF SHOW AWARDS (rosettes) will be given in both the First and Second Shows for:
 - Rose specimen classes 1-28
 - · Horticulture specimens 29-99
 - Horticultural plants 100-110
 - Adult artistic 111-124
 - · Junior horticulture 125-133, and
 - · Junior artistic 134-139.

Exhibitors are limited to 2 entries per category in all horticulture classes and 1 entry per category in all artistic classes.

WOOD COUNTY FAIR – OPEN CLASS ENTRY SHEETS and EXHIBITOR PASSES are available in advance at the Wood County Fair Office. The computer printed tags that have not been picked up will be available in the flower show staging area during set up before the shows. No entry sheets will be accepted after two days before the shows.

AWARDS

JOHN MOORE CREATIVE DESIGN AWARD will be given in both the First and Second Shows for an outstanding or unique creative design. It will not necessarily be chosen from the blue ribbon winners. An acknowledgment card will be placed by the design and the winner's name will be put on a plaque.

THE FRIEDA SANDER PERPETUAL MEMORIAL AWARD

The Frieda Sander Perpetual Memorial Award will be presented to the exhibitor having accumulated the most points in the artistic division from both shows along with a monetary award of \$25.00. The award may be held for not more than two (2) consecutive years, after which the winner will be eligible to receive the award again. A plaque with the past winners will be on display.

GARDEN CLUB AWARD

The Garden Club Award will be presented to the garden club whose members accumulated the greatest number of points from both shows along with a monetary award of \$25.00. Points will be awarded in both horticulture and artistic divisions: 1st = 5 points, 2nd = 3 points, 3rd = 1 point.

JANE BURNS HORTICULTURE MEMORIAL AWARD

The Wood County Garden Clubs will present the Jane Burns Horticulture Award with \$ 25.00 to the exhibitor accumulating the MOST FIRST PLACE BLUE RIBBONS in Horticulture Division, Classes 1 through 112 from both shows.

JANE BURNS - JUNIOR HORTICULTURE AWARD

A\$20.00 check will be presented to the junior exhibitor with the most horticulture points from both shows.

THE FRIEDA SANDER JUNIOR AWARD

A \$20.00 check will be presented to the junior exhibitor having accumulated the most points in the Junior Artistic Division from both shows. Also, their name will be placed on a plaque that will be on display at the flower show during every fair. The award may be held for no more than two (2) years consecutively, after which the winner will be eligible to receive the award again.

Points for both awards are scored as follows: 1st = 5 points, 2nd = 3 points, 3rd = 1 point

2025 GENERAL RULES applies to all classes

- Each driver must register and pay before inspection and sign a release form.
- The track officials and/or the promoter reserve the right to approve or reject any entry.
- Entry fee must be paid before car will be inspected.
- Each driver must be 18 years old with a driver's license, or 16 with a notarized release signed by a parent or guardian, parent or guardian must be present.
- No entries fees will be refunded after 2 hours prior to the derby or after vehicle has been inspected.
- All vehicles must be inspected 1 hour before the derby.
- Must be at least 6 cars to make a class. 5. If more than 20 cars, cars will be
 divided up into heats with top half going to feature. Non placing cars can buy
 back into consolation heat with top 3 advancing to feature. Must have actively
 competed in heat to enter consolation.
- Any driver not obeying the rules will be disqualified.
- No drinking of alcoholic beverages on the track or in the pit area.
- No deliberate hitting of driver's doors, no starter hits. Engines must be running.
- A time limit of about 60 seconds will be used, if a driver does not hit another
 car within the time limit, they will be disqualified. This is not an exact time, due
 to being more vehicles than officials we cannot see everything at one time.
 No Playing "possum", "sandbagging", or double teaming, this will result in the
 disqualification.
- Boundaries must be observed. Safe operation of vehicles must be observed in pit area
- No drivers working as a team or together in any heat. More discussion at the drivers meeting.
- All cars must be removed from the grounds within 12 hours, OR THEY WILL BECOME PROPERTY OF RUFF DEMO DERBY.
- No driver or cars are to leave the grounds and return to competition. If they do so it will lead to automatic disqualification.
- All drivers are responsible for their pit crews. Pit crew members can and will get drivers disqualified for not obeying rules.
- · NO REFUNDS for illegal vehicles.
- · Standard safety belts, helmets and eye protection are required.
- <u>Driver's door should be a contrasting color.</u> Example: black car-white door.
- Vehicle must have a clearly labeled number visible from each side for scoring purposes. Roof signs are permitted but must be secured
- · ANY CAR SPILLING GAS OR CATCHING FIRE WILL BE DISQUALIFIED.
- · All Air bags should be removed!

All persons in the pit area must have a pit pass - NO EXCEPTIONS. Drivers do not pay for pit passes. All rules will be followed, or you will not be permitted to participate in the contest.

Prize money: 1st - \$100 2nd - \$50

RULES

- All drivers must be 14 years of age (parental consent form for 14 17 yr. olds must be completed on site).
- 2. Drivers need to attend a driver's meeting one hour prior to the event.
- Drivers must wear an approved helmet with eye protection (no bicycle or football helmets) jeans, long sleeve shirt, and gloves.
- Mower must be a factory available mower, maximum 25 horsepower, no frame modifications or frame reinforcing other than where specified.
- No rear engine lawnmowers. engine must be factory (Briggs and Stratton, Onan, Kohler etc.)
- 6. Modifications allowed are leg guards from foot peg to rear fenders, these can be welded, if weld fails during competition, it's an automatic disqualification. You can also bolt leg guards instead of welding; however, no leg guards are to cover tires, if a leg guard breaks off or fails it's an automatic disqualification.
- 7. The other frame modification that can be done for safety of the driver is a rear bumper not allowed to exceed more than 4 inches out and must stay inside of rear tires. This may be no more than 1 ½ inch by 1½ inch square tubing or round pipe NO sharp edges.
- You may weld a bracket to protect spark plug, no welding on steering, and front or rear axles.
- 9. Hood on mowers must be stock, screwed or wired shut.
- Gas tanks must be secured and have cap on it, you will be disqualified if any leaking gas is observed. Only one-gallon of gas maximum allowed.
- 11. You can use any seat on the mower to help protect your back and ribs. A cage around the seat is permitted but can be no wider than the fenders.
- You can secure the battery area of your mower to keep the battery from falling out, all headlights and rear lights must be removed.
- Mower inspection will be done immediately following the driver's meeting; all decisions are final by derby officials.
- 14. All mowers must be belt driven, changing of pulleys is permitted.
- 15. All drivers and crew must pay entry fee and gate admission to get into the grounds.
- 16. Depending on the number of entries we may have two heats and will decide by size of lawnmower and place you in the heat that fits the mower.
- 17. Remember that the only bracing that can stick out from the frame is that behind the seat see rule #7.

POWER WHEELS DEMOLITION DERBY RULES

- Any regular electric standard size Power Wheel is allowed with the following restrictions: no ATV, quad, motorcycle etc. type vehicles allowed; child's leg must be in a compartment; any vehicle deemed to be unsafe for any reason will not be allowed to complete; decisions of officials are final.
- 2. Kids 3-8 of age may participate.
- 3. Helmets must be worn (bicycle helmets, etc.).
- 4. Participants will have up to ten minutes to make hits.
- The vehicle is allowed to have UP TO a 12-volt lawn mower battery, which cannot be mounted in the passenger seat and battery must be secured and sealed away from the child. Motor must remain stock. The ONLY modification allowed is a lawn mower battery.
- 6. All doors and tailgates must be strapped shut. No sharp edges. Use zip ties or duct tape or another flexible product for making them stay shut. Tires may be covered in duct tape to prevent them from breaking. Cosmetic changes are acceptable; however, no reinforcement will be allowed to the Power Wheels (body, frame, etc., must be original).

GENERAL RULES

Each member competing in any Varsity, Junior Varsity, Freshman, or Junior High/ Middle School division must be a current enrolled student for the 2025-2026 school year with the school's team they are representing. The submitted list of competitors must have the signature of the school's building principal or athletic director verifying each cheerleader's enrollment. Any such team without a principal or athletic director's signature will be entered in the All-Star division.

- Combined squads must compete at the higher level.
- Each team must be accompanied by a coach or an adult 21 years old or older.
- Each team will have a three minute and thirty second time limit to perform at least one cheer, one chant and one dance routine. These requirements may be used more than once and in any order within the time limit.
- The competition will take place on the track in front of the grandstands. You may use as much of the 42'x42' mat as you need. There will be no "out of bounds".

However, we suggest all tumbling be performed on the mat for safety reasons.

- Squads will enter the competition area from the west and exit to the east.
- Team may spirit while being introduced next to the mat. They will then be told to take their positions, at which point they will walk quickly onto the mat, place their props and go to their starting positions.
- Time begins with the first motion, word, cheer, or dance after the announcer says "You may now begin your competition". Time stops with the last of all of the above. Entrance and exit are not included in the performance time. Penalties will be given for extra seconds. You may enter and exit from anywhere on the mat.
- No pyramids or mounting of any kind is permitted. A pyramid/mounting is when a person is supporting another person who has both feet off the ground.
- No springboards or mini trampolines will be permitted. Pom-poms and props are
- In the non-tumbling divisions, teams cannot perform any gymnastics where the performer's feet go above or over the performers head at any time. However, forward, backward, hip, or shoulder rolls, and heel stretches and kicks are permitted in this division.



- All moves and music must be in good taste, suitable for family viewing, and age
- No jewelry with the exception of stud earrings will be permitted.
- There will be no assigned practice time on the competition mat other than for open tumbling. There is plenty of room elsewhere on the track for your squad to
- One representative from each squad will be responsible for running your music during the competition. Please provide two CDs of your music. Some custom made CDs may not play on some sound systems so you should bring some other form of backup (ipad, iphone, etc). Our sound system is located behind the competition mat. It is the responsibility of each squad representative to meet with the sound system person prior to the competition.
- In the event your routine is interrupted because of failure of equipment you will be permitted to restart your routine from the beginning or continue where you stopped - your choice. In the case of serious injury and your routine needs to completely stop, you may continue from the stopping point or stop completely.
- There will be qualified judges scoring the competition.
- Penalties: Any entry which does not adhere to any or all of the rules may be disqualified and automatically give up any rights to any awards.
- Deductions: 10 points for inappropriate moves or music requirement violations
- 2 points (per violating cheerleader) for the wearing of jewelry.
- 2 points (per violating cheerleader) for stepping or tumbling on signs or pom-poms.
- 1 point for each second over allotted time.
- In the event of a tie, the squad with the highest points in showmanship will be declared the winner. The decisions of the judges - including any penalties, are issued at their sole discretion and are final.
- Judges rating sheets will be distributed immediately following the awards ceremony. Trophies will be presented to the top two squads in each division. Members of the first place squads will receive neck ribbon medals in addition to the team trophy.





RULES CONCERNING PIGS

- 1. All pigs treated according to Health Regulations.
- 2. Pigs are to weigh between 40 and 50 pounds.
- All pigs will be purchased by the committee appointed by the director in charge.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR CONTESTANTS

- All expenses for the feed, facility and any vet care are the responsibility of the winner.



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CAMPING REGULATIONS

- The fee for a camping lot is \$250.00. Anyone reserving a camp lot must also purchase one membership or exhibitor ticket. Fees are due when reservations are made at the Fair Office.
- 2. Primitive camping lots are available for \$176. (40x70)
- Executive camping lots with 50 amp hook up are available for \$350.
 Anyone reserving a camp lot must also purchase one membership or exhibitor ticket. (20x50)
- All Golf Carts must be registered with the Fair Office and follow all Golf Cart/Gator Regulations.
- Campers may reserve their same camping lot for the upcoming fair at the conclusion of the current fair to the last business day of February, by paying all camping fees in full. (Future camping prices are subject to change.)
- 6. Camping permits must be displayed and visible from the road at all times.
- 7. The Directors camping area is north of the F.O.P. Building. Once a Director leaves the Fair Board, they must leave the Directors camping area for the next Fair. Directors may keep their previous camping spots in the regular campgrounds if they choose or they may opt to select an open site in the regular campgrounds after the February renewal deadline. Directors/staff will have site selection options before sites are open to the public for open camping registration.
- 8. Each camping unit must include a supervisory adult.
- Any camping unit to be occupied by a youth under 21 years old must be registered by their parent or legal guardian who will be responsible.
- Loud noise, abusive language, large annoying parties, underage drinking, drugs, hazardous activities and any other annoyances will mean immediate eviction. No fees will be refunded.
- 11. Campfires:
 - · Permitted in camping areas only.
 - · Fair Board and Fire Marshals have the right to restrict any or all fires.
 - · Any campfire burning must always have a responsible adult present.
 - Campfires are to be in a ring no larger than 20 inches in diameter.
 WCAS does not provide fire rings. Flames can be no higher than 24 inches from the ground.
 - · All fires must be extinguished by 2:00 a.m.
 - Campers must clean up ashes from the campfire after the fair. Anyone not complying will be subject to a fine.
- 12. All camping units must have adequate fire extinguishers.
- 13. Two (2) vehicular parking permits will be issued to each campsite. A MAXIMUM OF 2 VEHICLES ALLOWED PER CAMPING LOT IN THE NORTH CAMPING AREA. Extra vehicles should be parked north of the campgrounds NOT on vacant campsites and NOT in the East parking lot. The East Parking lot will be closed at 2am with absolutely NO overnight parking.
- 14. Pursuant to O.R.C. 4511.681 Parking on Private Property Prohibited Acts: All campground roadways are considered fire lanes. Fire lanes are to be kept open at all times. NO EXCEPTIONS
- 15. Trash must be put in the proper containers provided for trash.
- 16. Anyone allowing any wastewater or sewage to be discharged on the grounds is subject to immediate eviction from the grounds.
- 17. Dump stations are provided for all registered campers.
- 18. One camper trailer, tent, bus, or any other unit allowed per campsite.



- One electric hookup permitted per lot. Must have 10 gauge drop cord, 3 prong plug.
- 20. Each camping unit will be required to have a back flow valve on the water hook up hose. Units are subject to be inspected by the camping committee and if the unit is found not in compliance, you will be given 24 hours to install one or the water will be turned off. Anyone failing to comply with these regulations will be asked to leave the grounds. All decisions are at the discretion of the camping committee.
- 21. No swimming pools, hot tubs, clothes lines, couches, overstuffed chairs, ice machines and/or extra appliances are permitted in the campground/camping areas.
- 22. No camping units allowed in Fair Grounds before Thursday 5pm., July 24th. 2025.
- ALL camping units must be removed by 8:00 p.m. Monday, August 4th, 2025.
- 24. A fee of \$50.00 per day will be charged for any camper that is in place before or after the above dates. Any camper that is on the grounds as of Wednesday, August 6th, 2025, will be towed at owner's expense. If the fee is not paid before next year's camping privileges may be revoked.
- 25. No stakes are allowed to be driven into the ground unless approved by the camping committee prior to installation. If a water line is broken due to a stake being placed without permission, the camper will be responsible for all fees associated with fixing the water line.
- 26. Pets are not allowed in the Fairgrounds at any time. All pets will be restricted to campgrounds only and must be on a leash at all times. Failure to follow rules will result in pets removed from the grounds. Owners must clean up after pets.
- 27. The Society reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions, and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of or connected with, or incident to the Wood County Agricultural Society, and the right to amend or add to these rules as its judgment may determine. Any exhibitor who violates any of the rules will forfeit all privileges and premiums and/ or will be subject to such penalty as the Management may order.

New Golf Cart Rules are coming for 2025 to promote safety on the fairgrounds.

Those rules will be available on the website by June 1, 2025.

PARKING REGULATIONS

- 1. Parking in the fairgrounds parking lots will be free, and there will be a limited amount of parking on the fairgrounds with proper sticker.
- 2. No parking on campsites other than your own. Vehicles in campground must be parked completely off of the driveway. Vehicles parked on other people's campsites or parked on the driveway will be towed at owner's expense. Extra vehicles must be parked in general parking area north of the campgrounds.
- Vehicles parked inside of the perimeter fence after 10:00a.m. daily will be towed at owner's expense.
- The parking area on the north grounds with two entrances off Brim Road provides ample space for all livestock exhibitors to park their vehicles. This includes cars, trucks and trailers. All need to park north of campers. ALL LIVESTOCK TRAILERS MUST PARK NORTH OF THE CAMPGROUNDS, ALONG FENCE.
- 5. HANDICAPPED PARKING will be available in the South parking lot off Poe Road towards the front row, there is a limited number of spaces.
- 6. DELIVERY VEHICLES must use Gate A off Haskins Road before 10a.m. daily.
- 7. Participants for pull in shows must use Gate A off Haskins Road
- 8. Parking will be reserved on west side of the Administration Building for emergency vehicles.
- 9. Anyone needing information on where they should park can get that information at the Fair Office or online.
- 10. Parking will not be permitted in the marked fire lanes. Vehicles parked in fire lanes will be towed at owner's expense.
- 11. The Wood County Fair Board is not responsible for any damage to or loss of items left in vehicles.
- 12. Commercial exhibitors should park in the lot south of Poe Road.
- 13. No overnight parking in the East Parking Lot.
- 14. Pursuant to O.R.C. 4511.681 Parking on Private Property Prohibited Acts.
 - a. All campground roads are fire lanes no parking.
 - b. Two (2) permitted vehicles per campsite.
 - c. All other posted parking regulations.



RESERVED PARKING REGULATIONS

For Passenger Vehicles Only, not to be used as a camping area. Anyone caught sleeping in vehicle will forfeit all privileges. Preferred Parking Privileges Begin July 27th, 2025, at 8 a.m. and end at the conclusion of fair on Sunday August 3rd, 2025.

- 1. Reserve Parking will be available at the numbered parking spaces by the Junior Fair Building.
- 2. Reserve Parking spots will be assigned, and a corresponding number will be issued. Lot numbers will not be replaced.
- 3. Lot Number must be on a hang tag displayed on the rear view mirror at all times or vehicle will be towed at owner's expense.
- 4. Anyone not parking in his or her assigned spot will be towed immediately at the owner's expense.
- 5. Cost for Reserve Parking is \$50.00 (must have membership to purchase)
- People holding reserved parking spots may reserve their same parking spots for the upcoming fair at the conclusion of the current fair to the last business day of February, by paying all parking fees in full. (Future parking prices are subject to change.)
- 7. Parking spaces cannot be sold or traded.

- 9. Reserve parking privilege passes can be picked up at the Fair Office anytime till the end of Fair.







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COMMERCIAL EXHIBITOR/ SOLICITATION INFORMATION

SOLICITATIONS

Section 1711.12 O.D.A. Red Book

During an Ohio State Fair or county or independent agricultural society fair, no person shall cry, hawk, sell, or expose for sale any merchandise except the official fair or race program upon any public road at any point within one thousand feet of any entrance or exit of any fairground or, within the fairground, engage in any solicitation more than four feet from a concession booth assigned to such person, except vendors under contract may solicit within the immediate area of a grandstand or coliseum for the purpose of vending food, soft drinks, and souvenirs directly related to the program attraction.

PLEASE NOTE

Advertising or sale of alcoholic beverages, lottery tickets and games of chance are not allowed on the fairgrounds or within 1,000 feet of any exit or entrance to the fairgrounds.

CONCESSIONAIRES & EXHIBITORS

Only those who have contracts with the Fair Board to sell on the grounds may do so, and they must observe all laws, rules and regulations at all times.

CONDITIONS REGARDING COMMERCIAL EXHIBITORS

- Rental rates, electrical charges, contracts for exhibitors and other information regarding commercial exhibits can be obtained by contacting the Wood County Fair Office, Box 146, Bowling Green, Ohio 43402, and/or Phone: 352-0441. All charges are due before the exhibitor opens the booth.
- All workers must have a pass upon entering the fair. Each commercial vendor space will be given sixteen (16) complimentary passes. Additional passes will need to be purchased at the Administration Office for \$5. Wristbands can be obtained at the gate each day for re entry. No refunds will be given for lost passes.
- Vendors are not permitted to park on the fairgrounds. Free parking can be found located in the Poe Rd parking lot on the south side of the Fairgrounds.
- Trucks and cars will not be allowed in areas of exhibits or midway, except for loading or unloading, and this should be done before 10 a.m. daily.
- 5. All vendors are required to have a \$1,000,000 Certificate of Liability Insurance that is submitted to the Fair Office prior to the vendor setting up any commercial space. These certificates may be turned in in person, by mail or through email at office@woodcounty-fair.com. All vendors also agree to not hold the Wood County Agricultural Society responsible for any claims, demands, liabilities and cost of attorney fees connected to an event at the Wood County Fair.
- Exhibits can be set up on Friday, noon 6 pm or Saturday after 8 am. All
 exhibits should be ready for the public by 8:00 a.m. on the first Sunday and
 must remain intact until 11:00 p.m. on the last Sunday.
- All exhibits must be manned from 10:00 am 10:00 pm daily throughout the fair. Exhibits that are not manned by be asked to leave and/or not be permitted to secure space for the following year.
- All exhibits in tents must be removed by 10:00 a.m. Monday. All other exhibits
 must be removed by Monday 12:00 noon following the Fair, unless other
 arrangements are made in advance. Otherwise, anything left past Monday 12
 noon will become property of Wood County Agricultural Society.
- 9. All exhibitors must conform to all Ohio laws and fair rules that apply to exhibitors, and be responsible for their own acts and exhibit area. Ohio Revised Code 901-0-2-02 states "every concessionaire/exhibitor shall work only in front of his/her concession/exhibit and shall not be four feet over his/ her counter while working the fair."
- 10. Exhibits should be kept neat and orderly at all times, free of debris. Rubbish should be placed in front of the exhibit area each morning by 5 a.m., at which time regular fair maintenance personnel will collect rubbish and haul it away. All other times, debris should be kept in containers, supplied by the exhibitor.
- 11. All free handouts and items for sale in commercial spaces must be approved by the Wood County Agricultural Society. No Helium balloons, toys resembling firearms/weapons, laser lights of any kind or silly string are to be sold, displayed or used on Wood County Agricultural Society property.
- 12. All exhibits/products must be family and community friendly. The Wood County Agricultural Society reserves the right to prohibit the sale or display of any material deemed offensive. Examples are, but not limited to items with foul language, derogatory speech, confederate flag, etc. This is a family friendly community event and we pride ourselves in bringing people together, please support us in our effort.

- 13. No vendor is permitted to sell weapons.
- 14. No loud speakers that interfere with other exhibitors will be permitted.
- 15. Exhibitors must furnish their own fuse and switch box, all wire and other materials needed for their space. Only authorized Fair Electricians shall make connections to power lines. Fair Electricians will perform other services for exhibitors on request and collect directly from the exhibitor.
- 16. Space will be assigned by the Wood County Fair, so as to provide the best possible arrangement of all exhibits, and assure the best possible traffic for all exhibit areas.
- All vendors must follow the current fire codes and provide proper equipment for their exhibit.
- 17. Anyone failing to comply with these rules will be removed from the grounds. No refunds will be given for fees paid. Vendors in question, will not be permitted to return for future events.

FIRE SAFETY REGULATIONS & PRECAUTIONS

The Wood County Firefighters Association will provide fire equipment and manpower to provide fire protection on the fairgrounds during the fair week.

- 1. No smoking in any buildings, stands, or tents on the fairgrounds.
- 2. No operations of wood stoves will be permitted on the fairgrounds.
- Camp fires are permitted with approval by the Wood County Fair Board and must follow written regulations of the Wood County Fair Board.
- All marked fire lanes will be kept open at all times (minimum of 18 foot clearance)
- All fire hydrants will be kept clear with no obstructions at all times (minimum of 15 foot clearance)
- 6. All tents will be fireproofed.
- 7. All decorations in exhibits will be flame resistant.
- 8. All exits and aisles will be kept open and clean.
- All buildings, food stands, food tents, and other commercial exhibits will have a minimum 10 lb. Type "ABC Multi-purpose" extinguisher within the structure.
- 10. All food stands with grease frying or cooking capabilities will have a type "K" extinguisher within the building, stand, or tent.
- All fire extinguishers will be up to date on service and certification (1 year test date).
- All electrical wiring will meet Wood County building codes and be approved by Fairgrounds Electrician.
- 13. No number 16 gauge or 18 gauge electrical extension cords are to be used.
- 14. All animal bedding will be kept moist if inside buildings or tents.
- 15. All petroleum products will be stored outside of buildings, stands, or tents in approved containers.
- Adequate metal containers for disposal of trash and waste products shall be provided.
- 17. Adequate metal containers for disposal of smoking material shall be provided.
- 18. Fair Committeemen should help enforce all fire regulations.
- 19. All buildings, stands, and tents will be kept in a safe manner at all times.

SPORTSMANSHIP RULE

The Wood County Agricultural Society, Ohio State University Extension, FFA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and all involved in the Wood County Fair support a code of good sportsmanship in all events and promote learning and responsibility through its activities.

Verbal abuse, physical abuse or harassment toward directors, judges, ring stewards, superintendents, employees, OSU extension staff, junior fair members, club advisors or volunteers of the Wood County Fair will not be tolerated.

You may be escorted from the fairgrounds; premiums forfeited, and upon Wood County Agricultural Society Fair Board decision, the family members may not be able to exhibit at the Wood County Fair for a period of time indicated by the board based on the severity of the situation.

DUCKS:

Class I — D (drake) male bird hatched prior to Jan. 1 of this year.

Class II — H (hen) female bird hatched prior to Jan. 1 of this year.

Class III — YD (young drake) male bird hatched after Jan. 1 of this year.

Class IV — YH (young hen) female bird hatched after Jan. 1 of this year.

GEESE:

Class I — G (gander) male bird hatched prior to Jan. 1 of this year.

Class II — GO (goose) female bird hatched prior to Jan. 1 of this year.

Class III — YG (young gander) male bird hatched after Jan. 1 of this year.

Class IV — YGO (young goose) female bird hatched after Jan. 1 of this year. Any specimen showing symptoms of disease will be refused or taken from exhibit and isolated, if possible.

Health requirements are found at the front of the fair book.

All exhibits entered at owner's risk. Entry tags must be securely attached to the cage.

Owners must furnish feed and make provisions for care of exhibits which include non spillable water containers and dry bedding. Coops will be furnished for waterfowl, coops must be cleaned out at end of the fair.

NEW FOR 2025: Exhibitors must sign out with barn officials after final cleaning or risk of being banned from exhibiting the following year. Do not fold cages! ODA requires all birds to be ID'd. Leg bands will be attached during check-in. Show will be classified.

American Standard of Perfection and comparison method of judging will be used. Need not be present for judging. Judging will take place at the cage where birds are displayed.

Wood County Fair. Violators may be removed from the fairgrounds

HEALTH RULES

901:1-18-01 Chapter's application.

(A) Animals listed in this chapter when moved or imported into Ohio for exhibition purposes only shall comply with the requirements of this chapter and when in compliance with the provisions of this chapter shall, with the exception of rules governing movement and importation of quarantined animals, be exempt from any other rules governing movement within or importation into Ohio.

(B) Animals moved within or imported into Ohio for any purpose in addition to exhibition shall meet all movement and import requirements of Chapter 901:1-17 of the Administrative Code.

901:1-18-02 Definitions.

As used in this chapter:

- (A) "Exhibition" means any public show of animals which is sponsored by or under the control of an Ohio county or independent agricultural society organized under Chapter 1711. of the Revised Code; or the Ohio state fair; or which is assembled for a period which exceeds thirty-six hours or contains animals of origins other than Ohio
- (B) "Certificate of veterinary inspection" means a form from the state of origin which has been issued and completed by a licensed and accredited veterinarian attesting to the health status and identification of an animal listed thereon.
- (C) "Approved veterinarian" means any licensed and accredited veterinarian approved by the Ohio department of agriculture, or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture or the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services.
- (D) "Licensed and accredited veterinarian" means a person who is licensed by the state of Ohio to practice veterinary medicine and who is certified by the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services, to be an accredited veterinarian.
- (E) "Residue" means any poisonous or deleterious pesticide governed by 40 C.F.R. 180, any poisonous or deleterious substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 109.6, or any other substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 556.
- (F) "Contagious or infectious disease" means any disease, including any foreign animal disease, or vector, capable of transmission by any means from a carrier animal to a human or to another animal and includes dangerously contagious or infectious diseases.
- (G) "Tuberculosis accredited free herd" is one that has passed at least two consecutive annual negative official tests for tuberculosis in accordance with the "Uniform Methods and Rules – Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication", and has no other evidence of bovine tuberculosis

901:1-18-03 Exhibitions: sanitation, inspection and records.

- (A) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall have in attendance an approved veterinarian for the duration of the exhibit.
- (B) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall:
 - (1) Immediately, prior to an exhibition and under the direction of the approved veterinarian, thoroughly clean and disinfect each building, pen, stall, ring or other enclosure in which animals are to be quartered for exhibition;
 - (2) Have the approved veterinarian:
 - (a) Examine the certificate of veterinary inspection when required for an animal brought to the exhibition;
 - (b) Inspect within a reasonable time of arrival each animal brought to the exhibit for symptoms of any infectious or contagious diseases;
 - (c) Daily inspect each animal present at the exhibition for symptoms of infectious or contagious disease.
 - (3) Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit. The record shall contain the name and address of the owner of each animal and the species and breed of the animal.
 - (4) May order the immediate removal of any animal which in the opinion of the approved veterinarian places other animals at unacceptable risk of disease.
- (C) An exemption from the requirements of paragraph (B)(1) of this rule may be requested from the department and will be granted when, in the judgment of the department, cleaning and disinfection will serve no purpose. By way of example only, cleaning and disinfection will generally serve no purpose in a newly constructed building that has never been occupied.

901:1-18-04 Exhibitors.

(A) No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he knows or has reason to suspect is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease or residue.

- (B) The owner or bailee of an animal with symptoms of an infectious or contagious disease shall, when directed by an exhibition official, the approved veterinarian, or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture, immediately remove the animal from the exhibition premises.
- (C) Upon request, each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal, shall make available any certificate of veterinary inspection, registration certificates, vaccination certificate, and other documents to exhibition officials, the approved veterinarian or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture.
- (D) Each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal for which a certificate of veterinary inspection is required by rules 901:1-18-01 to 901:1-18-11 of the Administrative Code shall forward a copy of the certificate of veterinary inspection to the Ohio department of agriculture's division of animal industry.

901:1-18-05 Poultry and fowl.

- (A) All turkeys, chickens and gamebirds moved within or imported into Ohio for exhibition must:
 - (1) Originate directly from a flock or hatchery which is a participant in the national poultry improvement plan for the eradication of disease and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
 - (2) Originate directly from a flock which has had a negative test for pullorum/ fowl typhoid disease within twelve months preceding the opening date of exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
 - (3) Have had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease, within ninety days, preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
 - (4) Be tested for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease upon arrival at the exhibition by a tester approved by the Ohio department of agriculture and found negative.
- (B) The rapid whole blood test shall not be used to test turkeys for compliance with the requirements of paragraphs (A)(2), (A)(3) and (A)(4) of this rule.
- (C) Waterfowl, doves and pigeons are exempt from this rule.

901:1-18-06 Cattle.

- (A) Cattle moved within Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) The animals presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (B) All cattle imported into Ohio for exhibition must:
 - Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification;
 - (2) Originate from a tuberculosis-accredited free herd, an accredited free state or zone, or a modified accredited advanced state or zone;
 - (3) If originate from a modified accredited state or zone must comply with rule 901:1-17-03of the Administrative Code;
 - (4) If originate from an accreditation preparatory or a non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition:
 - (5) If from a brucellosis class A state or area/zone must be negative to an official brucellosis test within thirty days of the opening date of the exhibition unless: they are under six months of age, steers, or official vaccinates under twenty months of age (dairy) or twenty-four months of age (beef); and
 - (6) If from a brucellosis class B or C state or area/zone must meet all requirements for pre-entry testing as specified in 9 C.F.R. 78.9 and obtain an Ohio permit prior to movement.
- (C) Cattle from a brucellosis certified free herd or class free state or area/zone are not required to be brucellosis tested.

901:1-18-07 Goats.

- (A) Goats moved within Ohio for exhibition:
 - The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
 - (2) All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Administrative Code.
- (B) Goats imported into Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification; and
 - (2) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and
 - (3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection "the goats in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."
 - (4) Originate from a tuberculosis accredited free herd as defined in paragraph (G) of rule 901:1-18-02 of the Administrative Code for bovine tuberculosis

- eradication: or
- (5) Originate from a bovine accredited free state or zone, or a bovine modified accredited advanced state or zone; or
- (6) Originate from a bovine modified accredited state or zone must comply with rule 901:1-17-06 of the Administrative Code.
- (C) If originate from a bovine accreditation preparatory or a bovine non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition.

901:1-18-08 Horses, mules and ponies.

- (A) Horses, mules and ponies moved within Ohio for exhibition:
 - If not under quarantine and if they are free of any signs of a contagious or infectious disease; and
 - (2) If the animal is twelve months of age or older, the exhibition manager may require that the animal has been tested and classed negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition.
 - (B) Horses, mules and ponies imported into Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) Shall be accompanied by an official certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days of the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - (2) If the animal is twelve months of age or older, it shall be accompanied by evidence the animal was negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - (3) Upon request by an authorized representative of the Ohio department of agriculture, the person responsible for each animal must make available a chronological list of dates, places and events attended by this animal within thirty days prior to entry into Ohio.

901:1-18-09 Sheep.

- (A) Sheep moved within Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
 - (2) All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Administrative Code.
- (B) Sheep imported into Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the exhibition opening date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification; and
 - (2) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and
 - (3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection "the sheep in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."

901:1-18-10 Swine.

- (A) Swine moved within Ohio for exhibition:
 - The animals presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
 - (2) Will be exempt from the requirement of a certificate of veterinary inspection if they originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage V area.
 - (3) Swine originating from a pseudorabies stage IV area shall:
 - (a) Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - (b) Originate from a pseudorabies qualified herd; or
 - (c) Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition.
- (B) Swine imported into Ohio for exhibition:
 - Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - (a) Originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage V area or an area or country recognized by the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services as pseudorabies free; or
 - (b) Originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage IV area; and
 - (c) Be negative to an official pseudorables test within thirty days of the

901:1-18-11 Llama.

- (A) Camelids including, but not limited to, llamas, alpacas and vicuanas moved within Ohio for exhibition when presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (B) Camelids including, but not limited to, llamas, alpacas and vicuanas imported into Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be identified with

- official individual identification.
- (2) When presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of contagious disease.

TAMPERING RULES

901-19-01 Definitions

As used in Chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code:

- (A) "Accessory reproductive tissue" includes but is not limited to epididymis.
- (B) "Agricultural society" or "society" means a county agricultural society or an independent agricultural society that is organized under the laws of the state of Ohio.
- (C) "Approved" when used in reference to drugs, means approval by the United States food and drug administration for use in the species indicated on the label.
- (D) "Breed show or class" means a show or class limited to breeding stock of a specific breed of livestock.
- (E) "Class" means a division within a show or exhibition as defined by a sponsor.
- (F) "Department" means the department of agriculture created under section 121.02 of the Revised Code.
- (G) "Designee" when used in reference to an exhibitor, means a member of the exhibitor's family or household or any other registered or authorized representative of the exhibitor.
- (H) "Director" means the Ohio director of agriculture appointed pursuant to section 121.03 of the Revised Code.
- (I) "Drenching" means the act of using an instrument, including a bottle, placed in an animal's mouth to orally administer a liquid, food, or any other substance.
- (J) "Drug" means drug as defined in division (C) of section 4729.02 of the Revised Code and its metabolites.
- (K) "Drug use notification form" means the document completed in accordance with rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.
- (L) "Exhibition drug residue legal" means an animal has not been administered a drug; or if administered a drug the withdrawal period has elapsed at the time the drug use notification form is completed.
- (M) "Exhibitor" means any person who shows, displays, or exhibits livestock at an exhibition.
- (N) "Extra label use" means the actual or intended use of a drug in livestock in a manner other than in accordance with the drug label directions.
- (O) "Fair" means the annual exhibition held by the Ohio expositions commission, pursuant to division (A)(1) of section 991.03 of the Revised Code, or a county agricultural society or independent agricultural society, as reported to the director pursuant to rule 901-5-11 of the Administrative Code.
- (P) "Family" means the immediate family of an exhibitor, including but not limited to the exhibitor's parent, step-parent, foster parent, grandparent, step-grandparent, foster grandparent, brother, sister, step-brother, step-sister, half-brother, half-sister, son, daughter, step-son, step-daughter, or quardian.
- (Q) "Grand champion" means the highest placing livestock entry of a show.
- (R) "Household" means the permanent residence address of the exhibitor.
- (S) "Immediately" means the time period between the cessation of administration of a drug and the point at which drug residues in the livestock are within tolerance levels or at zero tolerance, unless a safe level has been established by the United States food and drug administration.
- (T) "Internal rule" means any rule adopted by a sponsor or applicable to the sponsor's exhibition, and includes all mandatory rules and those optional rules from which the sponsor does not exempt itself or its exhibition.
- (U) "Junior livestock show" means a show limited to exhibitors nine years of age or in the third grade through nineteen years of age, or as authorized to participate in either 4-H, FFA, or other youth organization.
- (V) "Label" means the attached label or the accompanying brochure that lists the approved species, dose, route of administration, withdrawal time and any cautionary statement; a prescription label; the requirements of labeling for an extra label use drug as permitted by the United States food and drug administration; and information provided by the food animal residue avoidance databank (FARAD).
- (W) "Licensed livestock facility" means a livestock facility licensed pursuant to Chapter 943. of the Revised Code or a similar law of another state.
- (X) "Mandatory rule" means any rule adopted by the director relating to food safety or the health, safety, or welfare of livestock and from which a sponsor may not exempt itself or its exhibition.
- (Y) "Market flock style project" means ownership including an individual junior exhibitor, family of a junior exhibitor or a cooperative made up of junior exhibitors. Through this type of ownership, the junior exhibitor(s) are to care for, groom, and select any and all birds to be used in exhibitions as well as actively participate in any decision making processes for the flock.
- (Z) "Market livestock" means exhibition livestock bred, raised and intended for slaughter for food purposes.
- (AA) "Market poultry" means birds including, but not limited to, meat chickens,

turkeys, geese and ducks.

- (BB) "Non-terminal show" means a show in which no livestock is required to be slaughtered.
- (CC) "Optional rule" means any rule adopted by the director from which a sponsor may exempt itself or its exhibition.
- (DD) "Outstanding market project" means the exhibitor ranking highest in the outstanding market project competition in a show.
- (EE) "Over the counter drug" means any drug that lawfully may be purchased without a prescription.
- (FF) "Partial terminal show" means a show in which no fewer than the grand champion and reserve grand champion in each show or market class of livestock are sent directly to slaughter or to a licensed livestock facility no later than or immediately following the conclusion of the exhibition.
- (GG) "Prescription" means prescription as defined in division (G) of section 4729.02 of the Revised Code.
- (HH) "Quarantine" means isolation pursuant to section 941.07 of the Revised Code.
- (II) "Reserve grand champion" means the second highest placing livestock entry of a show.
- (JJ) "Residue" means residues as defined in division (I) of section 941.01 of the Revised Code.
- (KK) "Show" means that part of the exhibition restricted to exhibiting a single species and category of livestock such as, by way of example, but not limited to, market steer, dairy goats and market lambs.
- (LL) "Slick clipping" or "body shaving" means having hair that is less than one half inch in length on the body of market hogs.
- (MM) "Terminal show" means a show in which all livestock entered in the show are sent directly to slaughter or to a licensed livestock facility no later than or immediately following the conclusion of the exhibition.
- (NN) "Tolerance level" means the detectable level of a residue or other substance in livestock, in a livestock test sample, or in food, as that word is defined in division (A)(2) of section 3715.01 of the Revised Code, in a level less than or equal to the maximum level determined to be safe, acceptable or non-violative by the United States food and drug administration.
- (OO) "Unlawful substance" means any of the following:
 - Any drug prohibited by division (E)(1)(b) of section 901.76 of the Revised Code; or
 - (2) A substance which is not normally found in or does not naturally occur in livestock; or
 - (3) A substance which is normally found in or does naturally occur in livestock, but is detected or discerned in an amount or area greater than normal; or
 - (4) Any drug required to be listed, but which is not listed on a drug use notification form: or
 - (5) Any drug present in an animal regardless of how the drug came to be present if the drug was not administered under paragraph (A), (B) or (C) of rule 901-19-04 of the Administrative Code.
- (PP) "Veterinarian" means any person licensed to practice veterinary medicine under Chapter 4741. of the Revised Code or under the similar laws of another state.
- (QQ) "Withdrawal period" or "withdrawal time" means the interval from the time livestock is removed from medication until all residues are within the tolerance level.

901-19-02 Types of shows; slaughter.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) The sponsor of an exhibition shall designate each of the shows held at the exhibition as one of the following types: terminal show, partial terminal show, or non-terminal show.
- (B) All of the following junior livestock shows or classes at a fair must be terminal shows or partial terminal shows unless at least thirty days prior to the opening of the show, the sponsor has submitted a written request to exempt a show from this provision, and the director has provided written authorization granting this request prior to the start of the fair:
 - (1) Market beef steer;
 - (2) Market hog;
 - (3) Market lamb;
 - (4) Market dairy steer:
 - (5) Veal calf; and
 - (6) Market goat.
- C) All livestock which participate in a terminal show shall be consigned to slaughter either at the conclusion of the show or immediately following the exhibition.
- (D) In a partial terminal show at least the grand champion and the reserve grand champion shall be slaughtered. Prior to the show, the sponsor of the exhibition may require that additional livestock from a partial terminal show shall be slaughtered. The livestock shall be consigned to slaughter either at the conclusion of the show or immediately following the exhibition.

- (E) All livestock required to be slaughtered under this rule shall be slaughtered at a meat establishment either licensed by the department or granted inspection by the United States department of agriculture.
- (F) Notwithstanding paragraphs (B), (C) and (D) of this rule, livestock required to be slaughtered under this rule may, at the option of the sponsor of the exhibition, be consigned to a licensed livestock facility for sale provided that:
 - The livestock is consigned either at the conclusion of the show or immediately following the exhibition; and,
 - (2) The livestock is sold only for slaughter.
- (G) From the beginning of the exhibition until departure for slaughter or consignment to a licensed livestock facility, the exhibitor or the exhibitor's designee shall be responsible for caring for the livestock.
- (H) Livestock destined for slaughter or consignment to a licensed livestock facility shall not be removed from the exhibition grounds until the livestock is transported to slaughter, to the licensed livestock facility, or until the sponsor approves movement of the livestock to another secure area for:
 - Disease control in accordance with paragraph (B)(4) of rule 901:1-18-03 of the Administrative Code; and
 - (2) Quarantine for residue to allow a withdrawal time as determined by the approved fair veterinarian or in accordance with the instructions listed on the drug use notification form to elapse and may be subject to testing.
- (I) All livestock destined for slaughter shall be subject to testing by the director in accordance with section 901.73 of the Revised Code.
- (J) Livestock carcasses passing inspection may be released for normal disposition. (K) During inspection or testing, if the livestock carcass is preliminarily determined to have been tampered with or found to contain an unlawful substance, one of the following shall occur:
 - (1) If the livestock carcass must be trimmed or reconditioned to comply with the meat inspection requirements, the carcass shall be trimmed and reconditioned and released to the exhibitor, unless the successful bidder accepts the trimmed or reconditioned carcass.
 - (2) If the livestock carcass cannot be trimmed or reconditioned, it shall be condemned in accordance with the meat inspection requirements.
- (L) Livestock entered in or eligible for a carcass contest prior to or during a terminal, partial terminal or non-terminal show must be exhibition drug residue legal at the time of show and eligible for immediate slaughter.

901-19-03 Auction sales at terminal or partial terminal shows.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) A sponsor may hold an auction sale of livestock exhibited at a terminal or partial terminal show.
- (B) An exhibitor who exhibits livestock at a terminal show or partial terminal show consents to participating in the subsequent auction sale.
- (C) All bidders at an auction sale following a terminal show or partial terminal show consent to the slaughter of the livestock or delivery to a licensed livestock facility.
- (D) Title to livestock sold at an auction sale and subsequently presented for slaughter or sale at a licensed livestock facility shall remain vested in the exhibitor. If the exhibitor is not the owner, the title to the livestock shall remain vested in the owner until the livestock has been passed by inspection and released in accordance with paragraphs (K)(1) and (K)(2) of rule 901-19-02 of the Administrative Code and passes all testing performed by or at the direction of the department or the sponsor. (E) At the discretion of the sponsor, the sponsor may collect the sale proceeds from
- (E) At the discretion of the sponsor, the sponsor may collect the sale proceeds from the successful bidder and retain the proceeds until the carcass of the livestock has been released, or may allow the successful bidder to withhold payment of the proceeds until the carcass is released. In the event the carcass is not released, the sponsor shall return the sale proceeds to the successful bidder.
- (F) Prior to the auction, the sponsor shall announce the identification of the exhibition livestock which have been administered drugs for which the withdrawal time has not elapsed.

901-19-04 Prohibited Practices.

This is a mandatory rule.

No person shall:

- (A) Administer or cause or permit to be administered a prescription drug to livestock either immediately before an exhibition or during an exhibition unless the prescription drug is administered:
 - (1) By or under the supervision and direction of a veterinarian;
 - (2) Only in accordance with label directions;
 - (3) In conjunction with a valid veterinarian-client-patient relationship;
 - (4) For a valid medical purpose; and,
 - (5) A drug use notification form is completed and filed in accordance with the applicable requirements of rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.
- (B) Administer or cause or permit to be administered an over the counter drug to livestock either immediately before an exhibition or during an exhibition unless the

over the counter drug is administered:

- By or under the supervision or direction of the exhibitor, the exhibitor's designee, the owner of the livestock or a veterinarian;
- (2) Only in accordance with label directions;
- (3) Only for a valid medical purpose; and,
- (4) A drug use notification form is completed and filed in accordance with the applicable requirements of rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.
- (C) Administer or cause or permit to be administered either a prescription drug or an over the counter drug other than in accordance with the drug's label directions unless extra label use of the drug is:
 - (1) By or under the supervision and direction of a veterinarian;
 - (2) Only in accordance with the extra label directions provided by the veterinarian;
 - (3) In conjunction with a valid veterinarian-client-patient relationship;
 - (4) For a valid medical purpose;
 - (5) A drug use notification form is completed and filed in accordance with the applicable requirements of rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code; and,
 - (6) An extended withdrawal time is assigned to the drug by the veterinarian as part of the extra label directions and reported on the drug use notification form
- (D) Show, sell, or offer for sale any livestock which contains an unlawful substance or has been subjected to unacceptable practices as outlined in rule 901-19-03 of the Administrative Code.
- (E) Show any livestock which contains a drug in an amount which exceeds the tolerance level if established or safe level; or, a drug for which the withdrawal period has not elapsed unless administered in accordance with paragraph (A), (B) or (C) of this rule.
- (F) Sell or offer for sale in an auction at a terminal or partial terminal show an animal that contains a drug in an amount which exceeds the tolerance level if established or safe level; or, a drug for which the withdrawal period has not elapsed unless administered in accordance with paragraph (A), (B) or (C) of this rule.
- (G) Exhibit an animal which has been tranquilized.
- (H) Make a false statement on a drug use notification form.
- (I) Fail to file or update a drug use notification form as required by 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.
- (J) Negligently cause an unlawful substance to be present in an animal.
- (K) Fail to sign a chain of custody form.
- (L) Violate a mandatory rule.
- (M) Violate any optional rule from which a sponsor or exhibition did not exempt itself.
- (N) Fail to render assistance as provided by section 901.73 of the Revised Code.

901-19-05 Responsibilities of an exhibition sponsor.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) Every sponsor of an exhibition shall appoint a person as its records official. The records official shall receive and maintain the drug use notification forms filed under rule 901-19-06of the Administrative Code.
 - (1) The records official shall reject any drug use notification form that is incomplete, illegible or unsigned. At the close of the exhibition the records official shall turn over the drug use notification forms received by him to the sponsor.
 - (2) The sponsor shall maintain all drug use notification forms for a period of one year from the close of an exhibition. The drug use notification forms shall be made available to the department for inspection and copying upon request.
 - (3) Review the submitted drug use notification forms prior to the show for compliance with paragraph (I) of rule 901-19-06 and rule 901-19-07 of the Administrative Code.
 - (4) Review the submitted drug use notification forms for compliance with paragraph (B) of rule 901-19-38 of the Administrative Code if applicable.
- (B) The sponsor of an exhibition shall provide information requested by the director on a form prescribed by the director at least ten days before the start of the exhibition.(C) Prior to the start of an exhibition, the sponsor shall establish a method of
- (C) Prior to the start of an exhibition, the sponsor shall establish a method of identifying each animal in a terminal, partial terminal, and non-terminal show and maintain a chain of custody for each market livestock animal from the show through consignment to either slaughter or a licensed livestock facility for sale. The sponsor shall maintain a record of the identity of each animal and its chain of custody for a period of one year from the date of the last day of an exhibition.
- (D) All county and independent agricultural societies and the Ohio expositions commission shall print Chapter 901:1-18 of the Administrative Code (Ohio's livestock health exhibition rules) in their premium book for the current year.
- (E) The sponsor of a county or independent agricultural society or the Ohio exposition commission shall provide a livestock exhibitor or an adult advisor, upon request, a copy of Chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code and print in their current premium book the following notice:
- "Chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code (Ohio's livestock tampering exhibition

- rules) will be made available to a livestock exhibitor or an adult advisor, upon request."
- (F) The sponsor may elect to include the entire text of Chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code within their premium book.
- (G) All other exhibitions shall provide to exhibitors, upon request, a copy of Chapters 901:1-18 and 901-19 of the Administrative Code and shall include the following statement in at least one written announcement prior to the beginning of the exhibition:

"The exhibition's management will provide, upon request of an exhibitor, a copy of Chapters 901:1-18 (Ohio's livestock health exhibition rules) and 901-19 (Ohio's livestock tampering exhibition rules) of the Administrative Code.

901-19-06 Drug use notification.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) The exhibitor and the owner of an animal are jointly and severally responsible for completing and filing out the drug use notification form in the manner required by this rule.
- (B) The drug use notification form shall be signed by either the exhibitor or the owner. If the person signing the form is a minor child, the form shall be cosigned by a parent or guardian of the minor child.
- (C) A drug use notification form shall be completed for every animal from which a test sample is collected at every terminal and partial terminal or non-terminal show, and for every animal that is administered a drug either immediately before or during an exhibition.
- (D) The director shall require a drug use notification form to be completed for the following livestock exhibited in a junior livestock show:
 - (1) Market steer;
 - (2) Market hog;
 - (3) Market lamb;
 - (4) Veal calf;
 - (5) Market dairy steer;
 - (6) Market goats;
 - (7) Market poultry;
 - (8) Lactating dairy cattle; and
 - (9) Lactating goats.
- (E) The drug use notification form shall be filed with the records official prior to the show in which the animal is entered.
- (F) The director may require a drug use notification form to be completed for livestock exhibited at any type of show including a non-terminal show.
- (G) If the information on the form regarding drug use changes or if a drug is subsequently administered at any time after the drug use notification form is filed, an updated drug use notification form shall immediately be filed with the records official. (H) No person shall submit an incomplete, illegible or unsigned drug use notification form.
- (I) When a drug use notification form submitted to a records official for livestock is incomplete, illegible, or unsigned neither the exhibitor nor the owner shall, until the defect is corrected:
 - (1) Receive any prizes or awards from shows in which the livestock was exhibited prior to the time the drug use notification form was to be filed.
 - (2) Participate in any shows or sales held subsequent to the time the drug use notification form was to be filed.

901-19-07 Quality assurance.

This is a mandatory rule.

(A) Except as stated in paragraph (B) of this rule, sponsors shall require exhibitors at fairs sponsored by county or independent agricultural societies or the Ohio exposition commission to annually attend or complete a quality assurance program sponsored and conducted cooperatively by the exhibition sponsor, Ohio state university extension, Ohio agricultural education, or agricultural commodity organizations.

(B) At the discretion of Ohio state university extension, or Ohio agricultural education, an exhibitor may pass a test based on the appropriate skill level for their age (twelve to fourteen or fifteen to eighteen) under the supervision of Ohio state university extension or Ohio agricultural education before exhibiting terminal or partial terminal market livestock, including market poultry, lactating dairy cattle and lactating goats in a junior livestock show. Youth who pass the test will be exempt from annual quality assurance re-certification until they move to the next age bracket or they are no longer a junior exhibitor (nineteen years of age or older on January first of their last year). Minimum standards for youth food animal quality assurance are as set forth in appendix A to this rule.

(C) Exhibitors who fail to attend or complete a quality assurance program or fail to pass the exam as outline in paragraph (B) of this rule may be subject to the disciplinary actions listed in rule 901-19-21 of the Administrative Code.

901-19-09 Drug residues in non-terminal show animals.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) A person may, notwithstanding paragraph (E) of rule 901-19-04 of the Administrative Code, show at a non-terminal show an animal which has been administered a drug provided they are in compliance with all of the following:
 - (1) The drug is a prescription drug or an extra label use of a drug and the drug is prescribed by a veterinarian pursuant to a valid veterinarian-client-patient relationship:
 - (2) The drug is administered or used only in accordance with label directions or the prescription:
 - (3) The drug is administered or used only for medical purposes; and,
 - (4) A drug use notification form is completed and filed in accordance with the applicable requirements of rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.
- (B) Milk or other food obtained from livestock which has been administered or treated with a drug and permitted to exhibit pursuant to paragraph (A) of this rule, shall not be used for human consumption.

901-19-10 Testing requirements and test results.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) Urine, blood, tissue and other test samples shall be collected in accordance with the department's protocol for the collection of livestock test samples at exhibitions. Test samples may be collected before, during, or immediately after a show. Deviation from the protocol shall be noted.
- (B) The director may at his discretion, collect any urine, blood, tissue, or other test samples from exhibition animals at the time of slaughter.

901-19-11 Humane treatment of livestock.

This is a mandatory rule

- (A) A person shall treat livestock in a humane manner and in accordance with acceptable commercial practices so as to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the livestock.
- (B) All exhibitors shall comply with and abide by the policy statement and "code of practices" of the Ohio livestock coalition.

901-19-12 Acceptable practices.

This is a mandatory rule.

The following practices are deemed acceptable to protect and promote the health, safety, and welfare of livestock:

- (A) Adding caffeine free soda pop, gelatin, or other sweeteners to drinking water in nominal amounts to encourage water consumption;
- (B) Hoof trimming;
- (C) Cosmetic dehorning in market class livestock;
- (D) Using collodion as a teat sealant, but for no longer than eighteen hours;
- (E) Adding molasses or other sweeteners to feed to encourage consumption;
- (F) Properly administered and approved growth implants;
- (G) Castration;
- (H) Beak trimming;
- (I) Dehorning;
- (J) Tattooing;
- (K) Hot or freeze branding;
- (L) Humane ringing;
- (M) Tail docking;
- (N) Ear notching;
- (O) Ear tagging;
- (P) Shearing;
- (Q) Drenching of livestock for a medical condition at an exhibition when diagnosed by a licensed veterinarian:
- (R) Acceptable surgery, including clamps, bands and chemical castration; and
- (S) Application of ice, ice packs, cold packs, or cold compresses prescribed to relieve heat stress or a medical condition diagnosed by a licensed veterinarian at an exhibition.

901-19-13 Unacceptable practices.

This is a mandatory rule.

The following practices are detrimental to the health, safety, and welfare of livestock and are prohibited:

- (A) Applying any electrical, mechanical, or other appliance to livestock repeatedly or for a prolonged time period in violation of 9 C.F.R.313.2(1979);
- (B) Hitting, striking, beating, or otherwise impacting livestock that induces swelling or enhances, transforms or changes the true conformation, configuration, or appearance of the livestock;
- (C) Applying any electrical, mechanical, or other appliance that enhances, transforms, or changes the true conformation, configuration, or appearance of the livestock, unless prescribed by the exhibition veterinarian;
- (D) Plugging of teats;
- (E) Sealing of teats using unapproved substances or for longer than eighteen hours using approved substances;

- (F) Injecting material into udders or teats for non-medical purposes or otherwise artificially modifying the appearance or conformation of the udder or teat;
- (G) Using ice, ice packs, cold packs, or cold compresses internally or externally other than in accordance with paragraph (S) of rule 901-19-12 of the Administrative Code:
- (H) Using a stomach tube or pump for any purpose other than for the relief of tympany or gas on the day of exhibiting;
- (I) Drenching of livestock at an exhibition is prohibited except as permitted under paragraph (Q) of rule 901-19-12 of the Administrative Code.

901-19-19 Absolute liability.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) Both the exhibitor and the owner of livestock are absolutely liable to discipline under rule 901-19-21 of the Administrative Code for the presence of an unlawful substance in livestock and unacceptable practices done to livestock.
- (B) If the exhibitor or the owner was a minor child at the time the unlawful substance or unacceptable practice was detected, the parent or guardian of the person shall also be absolutely liable to discipline under rule 901-19-21 of the administrative Code for the presence of an unlawful substance in livestock and unacceptable practices done to livestock.
- (C) The director or the sponsor when imposing discipline under paragraph (A) of this rule upon a person, may mitigate the discipline imposed based upon one or more of the following facts if established.
 - (1) The person did not introduce the unlawful substance into the animal or do any unacceptable practices to the livestock;
 - (2) The person had no actual or constructive knowledge that the unlawful substance was introduced into the livestock or that unacceptable practices had been done to the livestock;
 - (3) The unlawful substance was not introduced into the livestock and the unacceptable practices were not done to the livestock through the person's negligence.

901-19-21 Disciplinary action.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) Any person who violates a provision of sections 901.70 to 901.76 of the Revised Code or any provision of this chapter is subject to any of the following disciplinary actions:
 - (1) Disqualification from any exhibition;
 - (2) Disqualification of the exhibition livestock from any exhibition;
 - (3) Continuing education;
 - (4) Written letter of reprimand;
 - (5) Forfeiture or return of awards, prizes, premiums, or proceeds; or
 - (6) Pre-exhibition drug testing.
- (B) Disqualification may include any or all shows and classes and may be for any number of years.
- (C) Anyone who violates rule 901-19-07 of the Administrative Code may be given a letter of reprimand for the first offense.

901-19-31 Responsibilities of and assistance to junior fair exhibitors.

This is an optional rule. Wood County Fair will be opting out this rule for 2025.

- (A) A junior livestock show exhibitor shall be responsible for the continuous care, grooming, and preparation of the livestock entered in the junior livestock show.
- (B) An exhibitor may receive assistance in the care, grooming, and preparation of the livestock entered in the junior livestock show, provided that the assistance shall be limited to explanation or demonstration provided by the following:
 - (1) Family members;
 - (2) Household members;
 - (3) Advisors or adult volunteers of 4-H or FFA in the exhibitor's club or county;
 - (4) Vocational agriculture instructors;
 - (5) County extension agents;
 - (6) Department representatives:
 - (7) Veterinarians;
 - (8) Members of the exhibitor's 4-H club, FFA chapter, or other youth organizations; and
 - (9) Guest speakers of the 4-H, FFA, or other youth organizations.
- (C) Any person not specified in paragraph (B) of this rule who provides assistance to a junior livestock show exhibitor shall register in writing with the sponsor. The responsibility to register rests with the exhibitor. An assistant may register for more than one exhibitor. Failure to register constitutes grounds for disciplinary action against the exhibitor. Assistance shall be limited to explanation and minimal demonstration.

901-19-32 Breed shows or classes.

This is an optional rule. Wood County Fair will be opting out this rule for 2025.

Unless otherwise modified by a mandatory rule, the rules of the breed association

shall be accepted grooming practices for that particular breed's show or class.

901-19-33 Prohibited grooming practices.

This is a mandatory rule.

The following grooming practices are prohibited in junior market livestock shows unless those grooming practices are permitted under rule 901-19-32 of the Administrative Code:

- (A) Using any substance to enhance or change the color of the livestock, including the livestock's hide or hooves:
- (B) Adding any substance externally to build up, change or alter the shape or conformation of the livestock, including by way of example but not limited to rope, false hair, graphite, hemp, and powders;
- (C) Pigmented grooming aides or materials; and
- (D) Slick clipping or body shaving of market hogs except on the ears and tails.

901-19-34 Outstanding market project competition.

This is an optional rule. Wood County Fair will be opting out this rule for 2025.

An exhibition may provide for an outstanding market project competition in one or more classes. The competition may include an evaluation of the livestock, demonstration of the exhibitor's showmanship abilities, or a skillathon or interview judging. The skillathon or interview judging may include demonstration of the exhibitor's knowledge of quality assurance principles, as set forth in an industry publication or in a publication such as the "caring for animals" handout or by viewing the "caring for animals video" available from a county extension office.

901-19-35 Recognition of disciplinary actions.

This is an optional rule.

(A) Disciplinary action by a sponsor against a person for a violation of sections 901.70 to 901.76 of the Revised Code or Chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code shall be given full faith and credit and shall be honored at all exhibitions.

(B) A person who has been convicted of violating sections 901.70 to 901.76 of the Revised Code shall be prohibited from participating in any exhibition for a minimum period of three years.

901-19-38 False, deceptive or unacceptable practices.

This is an mandatory rule.

The following are unacceptable practices:

- (A) Castration of livestock for purposes of this rule which exceed the following criteria:
 - (1) Cattle over eight months of age;
 - (2) Swine over seventy-five pounds; or
 - (3) Sheep over seventy-five pounds.
- (B) Showing any market livestock which has been treated in accordance with paragraph (A), (B) or (C) of rule 901-19-04 of the Administrative Code when a side effect of the drug conceals, enhances, transforms, or changes the true conformation or condition of the livestock.
- (C) Any natural occurrence or surgical process which results in testicular tissue remaining in the body of exhibition livestock except rabbits and poultry.

901-19-39 Ownership requirements.

(A) No exhibitor shall register, enter, or exhibit in a junior livestock exhibition any of the livestock listed in paragraphs (A)(1) to (A)(7) of this rule unless the household, as defined in paragraph (R) of rule 901-19-01 of the Administrative Code, at which the exhibitor is registered at has owned the livestock for not less than the length of time listed:

- (1) Market steers one hundred fifty days;
- (2) Market dairy steers one hundred fifty days;
- (3) Market hogs sixty days;
- (4) Market lambs sixty days;
- (5) Market goats sixty days;
- (6) Veal calves sixty days; and
- (7) Market poultry within five days of hatch including all individual participants in a cooperative.
- (B) No exhibitor shall register, enter, or exhibit livestock in a junior breeding livestock exhibition unless the household, as defined in paragraph (R) of rule 901-19-01 of the Administrative Code, at which the exhibitor is registered at has owned the livestock or has had the livestock registered under the exhibitor's name for at least sixty days. (C) For any exhibition other than those listed in paragraphs (A)(1) to (A)(7) and paragraph (B) of this rule, the length of time a person shall own livestock before the person may register, enter, or exhibit the livestock at an exhibition may be set by either the sponsor of the exhibition or a breed association.

901-19-40 Meetings of the advisory committee on livestock exhibitions.

(A) Board meeting:

A regular meeting of the committee shall be held at least once annually after the fifteenth day of October and before the first day of December. The committee may

meet at other times as the chairperson or a majority of the committee members considers appropriate, provided the chairperson gives members written notice of any meeting at least seven days prior to the meeting.

(B) Notice of meetings

- (1) Regular meetings: Notice of all of the advisory board's regularly scheduled meetings, including date, starting time and location shall be sent to the committee members by either regular or electronic mail at least seven days prior to the meeting, and will be posted on the department's web site www. agri.ohio.gov and may also be provided to Gongwer or Hannah news service for website at least ten days in advance of all regularly scheduled meeting.
- (2) Special meetings: Notice of date, time, place, and purpose of any special meetings shall be placed on the department's website www.agri.ohio.gov and may also be provided to Gongwer or Hannah news service, as well as sent to media outlets that requested such information, at least twenty-four hours prior to said meeting.
- (3) Emergency meetings: Notice of date, time, location and purpose of all emergency meeting shall be given to all news media who requested prior notification, and on the department's website www.agri.ohio.gov.

(C) Any person may obtain prior notice of the date, time, and location of any regularly scheduled, special, emergency, or any of the aforementioned meetings when a particular type of business is to be discussed by requesting prior notification in writing from the "Ohio Department of Agriculture, Office of Animal Health, 8995 East Main Street, Reynoldsburg, Ohio 43068"; or by calling the animal health division at (614) 728-6220.

PROTESTS, JUDGING APPEALS and RULE VIOLATIONS

Protests, judging appeals and potential rule violations must be made in writing within 24 hours after discovering alleged violation, signed by the parties making protests, and filed with the Wood County Agricultural Society Fair Office, accompanied by a protest fee of \$100 cash which will be retained by the Society if the protest is not sustained. The Rules Committee will hear the protest, conduct an administrative hearing and announce its decision immediately to the Executive Committee who in turn will make a board presentation if necessary. The final decision shall be released within 30 days of the infraction.

Junior and Senior Fair Board Rules Committee and Dept. Heads under protest, maintains the right to use any reasonable means to investigate any allegations, formal or informal, part of or pertaining to Junior, Senior Fair matters. If protest is found valid, the deposit will be refunded.

Anyone having a problem, grievance or protest regarding any other matter should immediately take the matter up with the superintendent and committee of the department, or if that is not possible, report to Fair Headquarters.

PROCEDURES FOR CONDUCTING ADMINISTRATIVE HEARINGS

WHEREAS, the Wood County Agricultural Society Board of Directors (hereinafter "the Board") have in force rules and regulations governing the annual Wood County Fair and Wood County Junior Fair; and said rules and regulations occasionally require that an Administrative Hearing be scheduled because of alleged infractions of said rules and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Board has determined that it would be appropriate to adopt procedural guidelines for conducting said Administrative Hearings to the end that said Hearings may proceed expeditiously and fairly.

NOW THEREFORE, PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY SET FORTH IN THE CONSTITUTION AND THE BYLAWS OF THE WOOD COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY, THE FOLLOWING PROCEDURES FOR CONDUCTING ADMINISTRATIVE HEARINGS ARE HEREBY ADOPTED:

1. Application:

These procedural rules shall apply to all Administrative Hearings required to be conducted by the Wood County Agricultural Society, or any of its appended bodies, boards, or committees. These procedural rules shall apply to all hearings required to be conducted pursuant to the rules that govern the operation and administration of the annual Wood County Fair and Wood County Junior Fair and the rules and regulations that govern all participants and exhibitors involved in said Fairs.

2. Investigation of Alleged Violations of Infractions:

When a violation or other matter that may require the scheduling of an Administrative Hearing comes to the attention of the Rules Committee of the Wood County Agricultural Society, said committee shall assign one or more members of the Board of Directors of the Wood County Agricultural Society to conduct an investigation. The member or members of the Board assigned to conduct said investigation shall be the designated "Fair Officials" assigned to investigate, as that term is used in the "Rules Violations" provisions of the Wood County Fair Rules and the Wood County Junior Fair Rules.

Said officials assigned shall interview witnesses and gather facts concerning the alleged violation or other matter.

If said official(s) believe that there is sufficient evidence to warrant further inquiry,

they shall contact the parties allegedly involved in the violation or other matter, and make inquiry about said party's knowledge or participation in said violation or act under investigation. Thereafter, if said official(s) still believe that there is sufficient evidence to warrant further inquiry, they shall notify the Rules Committee that a full hearing should be scheduled. If they determine that there is insufficient evidence to warrant further inquiry, said official(s) may suggest to the Rules Committee that no further hearing is required. The Rules Committee shall have the final authority to determine whether or not to schedule a formal hearing.

3. Notice

If the Rules Committee determines that a formal hearing is necessary, said Committee shall cause written notice to be sent to the parties involved containing the following information:

- a. Scheduling the date, time and place for the same.
- Providing a statement of facts briefly outlining the alleged violation or matter that is to be determined by the hearing.
- c. Providing a statement advising the parties involved of the potential consequence or penalty that may result from an adverse ruling at the hearing.

A copy of these procedural rules shall be included with the written notice. Said hearing shall be scheduled within forty-five (45) days of the date the investigators file their recommendation with the Rules Committee.

4. Body Holding Hearing:

The hearing shall be held before a quorum of the Rules Committee of the Wood County Agricultural Society.

5. Conduct of Hearing:

The Fair Official(s) who investigated the alleged violation or matter shall be responsible for presenting their findings and evidence. They may call witnesses and present all relevant documentary evidence. The parties allegedly involved in the infraction or matter shall be entitled to examine the evidence presented by the aforesaid official(s) and shall be entitled to present relevant evidence in said party's favor or in support of said party's defense. They shall be entitled to call witnesses and present documentary evidence in their own behalf.

6. Representation of Parties and Witnesses:

Any party or person who would be affected by the decision of the Rules Committee, including the investigators, may be represented by an attorney or by such other representative of their own choosing.

A witness shall be permitted to be accompanied, represented, and advised by an attorney, but said attorney's participation in the hearing shall be limited to protection of the rights of said witness. Said attorney may not examine or cross-examine witnesses

7. Formality of Proceedings:

Formal rules governing the admission of testimony of witnesses and the admission of evidence applying to courts of law in the State of Ohio shall not apply to hearings before the Rules Committee. The Rules Committee shall have the authority to hear testimony, including hearsay testimony, and to receive and admit documentary evidence, including affidavits and copies of originals, that might not be admissible in a Court of Law, provided said Rules Committee first determines that said evidence or testimony is reasonably trustworthy and is relevant to the issues to be determined at said hearing.

8. Record of Proceedings:

The Rules Committee and/or any other party involved may elect to have said proceedings steno graphically recorded. If the Rules Committee determines to have said proceedings recorded, it shall notify the involved parties of its intention to record said proceedings at least two (2) weeks before the scheduled hearing date. If the involved parties determine to record said proceedings, they shall give written notice of said intent to the Rules Committee seven (7) days before the scheduled hearing. The party hiring the stenographer shall be responsible for paying for said stenographer's appearance. Any party ordering a transcript of the proceedings shall be responsible for paying for said transcript.

9. Extensions of Time:

The Rules Committee, for good cause shown, may grant reasonable continuances and extensions of time to complete the presentation of evidence or to call necessary witnesses

10. Format of Proceedings:

- (a) Each side shall make a brief opening statement outlining his or her presentation to enable the Rules Committee to understand the issues to be presented.
- (b) The official(s) assigned to investigate the matter shall present their evidence and witnesses. Witnesses shall be subject to reasonable questioning and cross-examination by the opposing party.
- (c) At the conclusion of the investigator's presentation, the party involved or accused of a violation shall present his or her evidence and witnesses. Said witnesses shall be subject to reasonable questioning and cross-examination by the opposing party.
- (d) At the conclusion of all of the evidence, each party shall be entitled to make a brief closing statement summarizing his or her presentation.

The investigator shall proceed first and the party involved or accused of a violation shall proceed second.

11. Decision by the Board:

The Rules Committee shall report its findings and recommendations to the Wood County Agricultural Society Executive Committee within a reasonable time after the conclusion of the hearing. Normally, said report and recommendation of the Rules Committee should be submitted within fourteen (14) days barring unusual circumstances

The Executive Committee shall review the findings and recommendations of the Rules Committee and make its report, together with its recommendation to the Board of Directors of the Wood County Agricultural Society within ten (10) days of the date it receives the Rules Committee's report and recommendations.

The Board of Directors of the Wood County Agricultural Society shall have the final authority to determine any rules violations or infractions and to determine any penalty to be assessed. The Fair Board shall announce its decision within twenty (20) days of the date it receives the report and recommendation of the Executive Committee. A majority of the total authorized members of the Board of Directors of the Wood County Agricultural Society shall constitute a quorum for purposes of making decisions under these Administrative Hearing Rules.

Eligibility

- The Wood County Junior Fair is open to all boys and girls regardless of race, color, creed, religion, sexual orientation, national origin, and handicap status. All exhibitors must be members in good standing of a Wood County youth organization that meets requirements of the Junior Fair Constitution (4-H, FFA, FCCLA, Scouts, Grange Youth, Farm Bureau Youth, or other organizations of Wood County acceptable to the fair board.)
- 2. Junior Fair Member Age and Eligibility:
 - a.) 4-H: To compete in fairs or other exhibitions, the following membership statements will apply. 4-H membership is based on a child's age AND grade as of January 1 of the current calendar year. Eligibility for Cloverbud participation begins when a child is age 5 and enrolled in kindergarten. Eligibility for participation in 4-H projects and competitive events begins when a child is age 8 and in third grade. Any youth age 9 or above is eligible for project membership, regardless of grade level. Membership requires enrollment in an authorized Ohio 4-H club or group under the direction of an OSU Extension professional or approved adult leader. A youth's 4-H eligibility ends December 31 the year he/she turns 19. Joining Ohio 4-H is a privilege and responsibility and is subject to the Ohio 4-H Code of Conduct and applicable policies of The Ohio State University.
 - **There will be no competition of any kind for Cloverbud members. 4-H members deemed non-competitive due to late enrollment will not be eligible for awards (trophies, rosettes, certificates) at the Wood County Fair. Members may be judged for completion, receive evaluation ribbons, exhibit projects at the fair, and receive a premium, but they are ineligible for any competition.**
 - b.) FFA: Entries are open to currently enrolled agricultural education students and/or program graduates working toward advanced degrees and awards. Exhibitors must be a part of or a continuation of the student agricultural program experience. FFA members may compete in Jr Fair competitions through December 31 the year he/she turns 19.
 - c.) Other Organizations: When a member has passed his/her 19th birthday as of January 1st of the current year, the member is too old to exhibit in the Wood County Junior Fair. The minimum age is set by the participating organization.
- 3. Dual Junior Fair Project Eligibility: Youth may be members of both 4-H (clubs) and FFA (chapters), or of either group. When a student belongs to both organizations, projects carried, in all cases, must be separate and different (also different animals and/or products) in an effort to broaden the student's experience and learning. The following examples will be considered separate and different projects dairy herd management (cows in production), dairy heifers not freshened; sheep breeding, market lambs; beef breeding, market beef (steers); swine breeding, market hogs; market goats, breeding goats; horse production, horse riding; laying flock, broilers; market rabbits, show rabbits; agronomic crops such as corn, soybeans, wheat, and specialty crops such as vegetable gardening, strawberries; electricity, woodworking; and other specialty animals and crops which must also be separate and different. No single project may be taken as both a 4-H and an FFA project.
- 4. No Junior Fair participant may exhibit in more than one Junior Fair unless they are a member of 4-H in one county and FFA in another. In this situation, they must exhibit different projects. (Example: market beef in one county and market swine in another.) A 4-H member is not allowed to be a member of two different county's 4-H programs. Youth are expected to affiliate with the youth program in the county of residence. However, in instances where youth live out of county, membership considerations will be given by the 4-H Educator/FFA Advisor only when a positive educational experience will result. An "Across County Lines" Application Form must be on file for 4-H members residing outside of Wood County. Junior Fair participants must successfully meet all requirements of their youth organization before being eligible to exhibit in the Junior Fair.

Jr. Fair Passes

- Each Junior Fair Exhibitor in good standing with their club or chapter will be issued a fair entry pass at no charge.
- Passes will be issued to 4-H Advisors approximately 1 week before the fair and the advisors will hand out the passes accordingly. FFA members will need to

- pick up their passes at the fair office during the week prior to the fair if their advisor does not pass those out.
- Replacement passes for lost or stolen passes may be purchased at the fair administration building.
- I. Any Junior Fair Exhibitor having part in creating a disturbance or who is removed from the fairgrounds by a law enforcement official for the use of drugs or alcohol or for any other reason or who fails to abide by the regulations and instructions of the leaders will be subject to discipline and premium and award forfeitures.

Livestock Project Entries

- All Jr Fair (4H, FFA, ect.) Livestock entries must be made through Fair Entry online. Deadline for all entries is June 1st at 11:59 pm.
- 2. There will be no entry fee for the Junior Fair, but there will be a \$50 fee assessed per exhibitor for any late entries after the deadline of June 1st and \$100 late entry fee after July 15th. Anyone entering after the June 1st deadline will not be eligible for grand or reserve champion.
- There will be <u>no late entries accepted</u> for the online add on sale or Final Lot (which takes place at the Livestock Sale of Champions).
- All animals exhibited in the barns must be entered and shown. No extra animals are allowed.
- All animals wishing to participate in County Born and Raised shows will have to upload the required information in the Fair entry system prior to June 1. No late entries will be accepted in these classes.
- All Breed/Registration paperwork must be submitted into fair entry by June 1 or the animal will be entered into a crossbred class.

Project Judging

4-H Projects

- Any project made for competition or for a grade in any other activity, such as FFA, FCCLA, Wool Contest, school or similar organizations, cannot be used as 4-H projects. Such projects will be disqualified from 4-H judging and fair exhibition.
- 2. All 4-H projects will be interviewed and judged prior to the fair. This will be conducted by OSU Extension Wood County and all Wood County 4-H rules must be followed. A judging schedule will be mailed to 4-H Advisors. Any project that does not complete the judging will not be eligible to show/display at the fair and will not receive a premium.

FFA Projects

- All FFA Shop and Crop Projects will be judged in place (no interviews) prior to the first day of the fair. The date and time will be set by the county ag teachers and published in the department rules.
- All Livestock projects must maintain project records (AET) and have them evaluated by their ag teacher or judged at Livestock interview judging to be eligible to show and be eligible for premiums at the fair. Other Jr. Fair Organizations
- All projects entered by other youth organization members must meet the requirements of that organization before they will be permitted to be exhibited or be paid a premium.

Fair Exhibits (Non Livestock)

- Each Junior Fair organization, club, or chapter wishing to display projects in the Junior Fair Building will be assigned a fair booth. All booth assignments are handled through OSU Wood County. Please contact them before May 1 to secure your space.
- Although reasonable effort will be made to protect exhibits from damage or theft, neither the Wood County Fair Boards nor OSU Extension or 4-H Committee, are responsible for the safety of any Junior Fair exhibit placed on display at the Wood County Fair.
- 3. Entries must be in place by 9 p.m. Saturday before the first day of the fair. Junior Fair Building (booths) will be released on Sunday at 9:00 pm. Violations of this rule will result in a forfeiture of any premiums won by the exhibitor and may cause them to be banned from future fair exhibitions. All exhibits must be removed from the Wood County Fairgrounds by the Monday after the fair, at noon or they will be disposed of.
- All non-livestock junior fair projects must be exhibited in the Junior Fair Building during the fair to be eligible for premium.
- Anyone needing to remove a 4H project for competition at the state fair must have permission to do so from the County 4 H Extension Agent or the Wood County Fair Manager prior to its removal.

Livestock Projects

Ownership

- 1. All Jr. Fair Exhibitors must comply with 901-19-39 found on page 70.
- 2. All Junior Fair livestock projects should be completely and fully owned (as evidenced by bill of sale or registration papers) including all showing rights, and in complete possession and continual care of the exhibitor. In the case of Equine or Dairy, it may be impossible to gain full ownership of an animal. The Junior Fair members must enter into a lease agreement with the owner for equine and dairy leases, and 4-H members must have complete and exclusive showing rights during the lease/ownership time. A copy of the lease documentation must be on file with the Fair Office by June 1st. Market animals that go through the sale cannot be leased.
- 3. Ownership of breeding stock will be interpreted as:
 - a. Owned by Exhibitor
 - b. Owned by way of immediate family farm enterprises (parent)
- 4. Registration papers or ownership/lease documents will be checked at the fair
- 5. Jr Fair Exhibitors (parent/guardian) are the owners/caretakers of their livestock projects and will need to obtain any VFD (veterinary feed directive) they might need to properly care for their food-producing animals. To obtain a VFD, the owner of food-producing animals must have a veterinarian-client-patient relationship (VCPR). In a VCPR, the 'client' is defined as either the owner or primary caretaker of the animals and is the person responsible for their ongoing feeding and care.
- 6. Exhibitors/Parents/Guardians are responsible for maintaining insurance for their animal until it is loaded on a market truck or released from the fair. Each exhibitor is responsible for any damage or injury which their livestock may cause to other individuals or property. Parents, please check your home-owner liability policy to see if it covers your animals on display at the fairgrounds.

These possession dates for Junior Fair livestock and poultry must be adhered to for eligibility at the Wood County Junior Fair.

Project Substitutions

Changes in animals after the possession dates listed will be made at the discretion of the Jr. Fair Coordinator and Sr. Fair Director in charge of that species . Unless identified on the specific ID Day, any animal substituted after the possession dates will be ineligible for championship classes at the Wood County Fair or the Ohio State Fair. Any market animal not participating in a required ID Day, if brought to the fair, will be ineligible for Grand or Reserve Champion. They are eligible for Showmanship. If an animal loses its ear tag following ID Day, take the tag (if found) to weigh-in at the fair for retagging.

Entry Limits

Refer to individual department rules for entry limits.

Drug Testing

- Project animals will be subject to pre-fair and fair inspection or testing at any time by designated fair officials or their representatives. Refusal to allow such inspection will disqualify the animal from exhibition at any county or state fair.
- 2. These animals may be tested following their species show.

Quality Assurance

- All Junior Fair market livestock, market fowl and market poultry exhibitors, and lactating dairy and goat animal exhibitors must participate in a scheduled Quality Assurance training meeting to be eligible to show at the Wood County Fair. (Livestock exhibitors to include market steer, market heifer, market hog, market lamb, market goat, market turkey, market rabbit, meat chicken (broiler), market ducks, market geese, lactating cows, and lactating goats)
- 2. The Wood County Quality Assurance (QA) meeting is April 27 at 7pm at the Junior Fair Building. All Junior Fair members must have completed a state sanctioned, county or club QA meeting by June 1st. If the exhibitor attends a State Quality Assurance, they must notify the extension office in writing prior to the June 1 deadline. If quality assurance is not completed by June 1st the member is ineligible to exhibit at the fair.

Drug Use Notification Form (DUNF)

- All Junior Fair market, feeder and lactating exhibitors are required to complete and sign the online ODA DUNF at all Ohio County and Independent Fairs. One DUNF is required per animal.
- DUNF's must be completed prior to weigh-in or the animal will not be allowed to weigh. Any market animal without a completed DUNF form will not be permitted to remain on the grounds for the fair and will need to be off of the ground before 8 am the first day of the fair.
- If at any time the information regarding drug use changes on the currently filed DUNF or if a drug is subsequently administered, an updated DUNF shall promptly be filed online.

Health Regulations

- Livestock entries are subject to the Ohio Livestock Inspection and Health Regulations. For more information visit www.agri.ohio.gov. Wood County Fair will be following all of the mandatory rules outlined in Chapter 901-19 and 901: 1-18 of the Ohio Administrative Code and 901.76 of the Ohio Revised Code.
- 2. Health regulations and Exhibition Rules for Junior Fair livestock shall conform to open class regulations and can be found on page 65 of this book.
- The Wood County Fair shall contract the services with a qualified veterinarian during the week of the fair. However, if an exhibitor desires to contact a different vet, he/she may do so at their own expense. The fair vet reserves the right to charge an exhibitor for any medical or surgical supplies dispensed.
- Please refer to rule 901-19-33 and 901-19-13 of the Ohio Administrative code for prohibited grooming practices and unacceptable practices for livestock exhibitions.
- 5. These rules prohibit applying any physical practice, electrical or mechanical appliance, device or appliance that enhances, transforms or changes the true conformation, configuration, performance, physiological state or appearance of the livestock, unless prescribed by the exhibition veterinarian for the immediate treatment and welfare of the livestock is prohibited. If such treatment is applied during the exhibition, the livestock are eligible to be shown. This law prohibits the use of any material, gas, solid or liquid, that conceals, transforms, or enhances the true confirmation of configuration of all livestock, including by way of example but not limited to rope, false hair, graphite or hemp.
- Wood County Agricultural Society prohibits the misuse of legal drugs and the use of illegal drugs for all animals. Tranquilized livestock, including those administered calf calm or diuretics for cosmetic purposes are also prohibited.

State Rules/State Fair

Exhibits properly entered in the Ohio State Junior Fair may be released from the Wood County Fair prior to arrival deadline at the Ohio State Fair per chairman of the department. Proof of entry to the State Fair must be made to the department chairman

Premiums

- Premium money is paid by the Wood County Agricultural Society to exhibitors for project exhibition.
- The premium disbursed is based upon amounts set for each category or department on an individual or group basis. Premiums will be as follows unless otherwise stated by department:

Clothing Projects - \$3.00

Food & Nutrition Projects - \$2.00

Miscellaneous Projects - \$2.00

Beef (per animal) - \$6.00

Swine (per animal) - \$6.00

Dairy (per animal) - \$6.00

Sheep (per animal) - \$6.00

Horses (per animal) - \$6.00

Poultry (per pen) - \$3.00

Rabbits (per pen) - \$3.00

Goats (per animal) - \$6.00

Premiums will be distributed in October in accordance with the 4-H Spirit Night program. Jr. Fair Youth Organization advisors will distribute premiums to members in a timely manner.

Livestock Sales

Wood County Jr. Fair Youth will have the ability to participate in a market sale (price per pound or by animal), the Livestock Showcase and an Online Add on Sale.

- These sales are a privilege and will be governed by the Livestock Sale Committee.
- 2. The rules/policies for these sales can be found on page 77 of this book.

Market Sale

- Any exhibitors wishing to sell their animal through Wood County Agricultural Society will be paid a price per pound or for the whole animal, depending on species for that animal at the time they receive their Online Add On/Showcase sale check.
- If an exhibitor is planning to send any cattle, swine, sheep, or goat on the market truck, provided by the Sr. Fair Board, it must be designated in Fair Entry and confirmed again at Check-In on July 26. No changes will be permitted after Check- In unless the animal is deemed a Grand/Reserve Champion in which it will become part of a terminal sale.
- If an Exhibitor chooses to take their animal home, they will receive a check for the Online Add On Sale only (not an additional market price per pound) for that animal

Livestock Showcase Sale and Online Add on Sale

 See Livestock Showcase Sale and Online Add On Sale rules on page 77 for complete rules.

Livestock Release

- Animals going on the Market Truck If available, please help load your market animal(s) onto the market truck.
- Any animal entered as going home will be permitted to begin the load out process a half an hour after the start of the main grandstand entertainment on the last night of the fair. Please see the Livestock release section of the Jr. Fair Rules.
- You will only be allowed to enter thru GATE A and will follow the flow path provided. This will be a LOAD AND GO line only. After loaded you must continue along the flow path and leave thru GATE A.

Livestock Housing

- All Livestock Housing assignments will be made by the Wood County Jr. Fair Coordinator in conjunction with Sr. Fair Department Chairs. No one is allowed to change those assignments without the consent of the Jr. Fair Coordinator or the Director in Charge of that department. Violations to this rule may result in forfeiture of premiums and/or inability to participate in the add on sale.
 - a. All Junior Fair exhibitors are required to keep individual animals and quarters clean at all times and must assist in the general cleanliness of the barn. Failure to comply with the above rule will constitute a violation.
 - b. All animals must remain in the areas around the livestock barns. No

- animals are permitted to be on the MidWay.
- . No Furniture is permitted in the barns
- All pens must be kept clean daily. Violators will be warned and receive the following:.

1st Offense: Written Warning;

2nd Offense: \$25 Fine;

3rd Offense: loss of premium and the exhibitor will be prohibited from participating in the add on sale.

- All animals must remain in the barn from the time of check in until the assigned project release time.
- NEW THIS YEAR... Exhibitors will have to check out with a Department Representative prior to leaving the barn. Any exhibitor failing to do so will lose all premiums, and will be prohibited from participating in the add on sale and/or be banned from showing at the next year's fair.
- 4. Grooming Chutes/stands will be required to be in designated areas. Exhibitors are required to keep those areas neat at all times. Exhibitors are encouraged to remove grooming shutes/stands at the conclusion of their show. All shutes/stands being housed behind the Pavilion MUST BE REMOVED by Sunday, the last day of fair, by 10 AM or they will be removed by the Sr. Fair Board and a fine will be assessed to have them returned.

Showmanship

- All showmanship classes will be determined by an exhibitor's age as of the current year and broken into 2 Divisions:
 - a. Senior Showmanship 14-18 years of age
 - b. Junior Showmanship 8-13 years of age
- Each division will be split into classes based on the exhibitor's age. The top exhibitors in each class will return for the champion drive. The showmanship champion drive will occur after all division classes are held. The number of exhibitors selected from each class will be determined by the judge.
- Sign-up for all Showmanship Classes will be done through Fair Entry by the June 1st deadline. Late entries may be accepted but they will require the late entry fee. You may choose to scratch this entry at weigh-in/check-in if you so choose.
- 4. Showmanship classes will be limited to 1 animal per exhibitor per department.
- All Showmanship Contest participants must show one of their own project animals which have been entered in the Junior Fair. Other family members owned animals do not count as one of their own animals.
- There will be an overall Supreme Showman, Reserve Showman, and 3-5 places for the Jr. and Sr. Divisions. Banners will be awarded for each of those winners.
- The Supreme Sr. Showman will represent each Livestock Department in the Showmanship Sweepstakes Contest. Rules for that contest can be found on page 77 of this book.

Dress Code Rule for All Junior Fair Exhibitors

- All Livestock exhibitors are required to look neat and professional for all shows and sales.
- Jeans, free of rips and holes are required of all species. Modest shirts, free from writing are required.
- No sleeveless, tank tops, backless or crop tops will be allowed. Long sleeved shirts are encouraged for many species.
- 4. Closed toe shoes are required at all times when working with animals.
- 5. Please see department rules for species specific rules.
- 6. Consequences for not following this rule may include class disqualification.

Livestock Care

- Every exhibitor shall hold primary responsibility for their own projects and individually share the care of group exhibits as directed by their leader.
- Every livestock exhibit shall be trained, so the exhibitor has control at all times. Any livestock not trained will be sent home.
- B. Each exhibitor must show his/her own animal at judging time unless they have more than one exhibit to be shown at the same time or is excused in advance. In such a case another Jr. Fair member from an organized Wood County 4-H Club or FFA chapter may show for them (preferably a Jr Fair member within the family). All exhibitors must show their own animal for showmanship.
 - a. Members are responsible for the care and feeding of their livestock until it is released from the fairgrounds. Failure to do so will first result in reprimand with a pink slip and if the situation persists, it will result in forfeiture of premium check and exhibitor will not be able to participate in the Online Add On Sale. Members must furnish all feed and other supplies.
 - b. Exhibitors shall be responsible for the continuous care, grooming, and

- preparation of the livestock entered in the junior livestock show.
- c. Exhibitors may receive assistance in the care, grooming, and preparation of the livestock entered in the Jr. Fair Shows, provided that the assistance shall be limited to explanation, teaching or minimal demonstration while not doing the actual work.
- All livestock exhibitors must be present, directly involved, and participating during any grooming of their animal.

Show Placing/Awards

- 1. All Jr. Fair market classes will be placed 1-5, and ribbons will be awarded unless there are not enough entries in the classes to warrant 5 placings. Those class placers have the opportunity to return to the ring for division champions. Divisions will be placed 1-5. Champion Drives will be made up of Division winners. Once an animal is selected in the champion drive, the next animal from that division/class will enter consideration. All five class/division placing animals need to be on standby for division/championship classes.
- 2. Any exhibitor called to the ring and does not show, he/she will be skipped and the next in line will move up.
- The top five overall animals will be selected during the champion drive and banners will be awarded.

Other Livestock Rules

- Only the exhibitor and/or a family member and the animal they are showing will be permitted in the staging area during show time.
- The Senior Fair department committees will make final decisions on any rules not covered in the overall Jr. Fair Rules.

Jr. Fair Code of Conduct

All Junior Fair Participants and Family Members will be expected to abide by the Wood County Junior Fair Code of Conduct. Improper conduct will result in loss of Junior Fair privileges.

In caring for my livestock I will:

- Provide food, water, fresh bedding and care necessary to protect the health and welfare of my animals.
- Make timely inspections of my animals to evaluate the health and ensure that all basic requirements are being met.
- Ensure proper handling techniques are used to eliminate undue stress or injury to my animals.
- 4. Be responsible for the care and fitting of my animals for the duration of the fair week.

As a Junior Fair Exhibitor I will:

- 1. Be a member in good standing with the youth organization that I represent.
- 2. Conduct myself in a courteous and respectful manner and exhibit good sportsmanship towards Junior and Senior Fair officials, judges, spectators, volunteers, parents and other Jr. Fair members. I understand that any individual whose comments to the judge (before, during, or after the fair) disputes the judge's decision or seeks to discredit the judge in any way is subject to forfeiture of all awards. Offender(s) will be removed from the fairgrounds. The decision of each judge is final and non-disputable. I further understand that Verbal abuse, physical abuse or harassment toward directors, judges, ring stewards, superintendents, employees, OSU Extension starfli junior fair members, club advisors, or volunteers of the Wood County Fair will not be tolerated. exhibitors, spectators and family members may be escorted / banned from the fairgrounds; premiums and the privilege to participate in the livestock sale(s) may be forfeited upon a Wood County Agricultural Society

- Rules Committee decision; the exhibitors and immediate family members may be prohibited from exhibiting at the current Wood County Fair and future Wood County Fairs for a period of time indicated by the committee based on the severity of the situation.
- Refrain from engaging with drugs, alcohol, tobacco or any other prohibited substance while participating in any Jr. Fair related activity.
- Respect and adhere to the rules, policies and guidelines established by the Wood County Agricultural Society.
- Agree to be bound by the decision of the Wood County Junior and/or Senior Fair Boards in case of any dispute arising from the interpretation or application of rules and guidelines set forth by Wood County Agricultural Society Officials.
- Dress for any Junior Fair event or activity in accordance with the show dress code rules.
- All participants, family members, or those acting on behalf of the family must follow the rules as set forth by the Wood County Agricultural Society.

Protests and Appeals

All rules pertaining to protests, rule violations and appeals will be handled in accordance with the Rule Violation and Protest rules found on page 70 of this book.

Penalties or Disqualifications

All rules pertaining to penalties or disqualifications can be found on page 70 of this book

- All exhibitors, parents, and public must abide by the rules of the Junior and Senior Fair or will be asked to leave the grounds, forfeit any premiums and awards, and will be subject to further sanctions appropriate to the offending actions.
- 3. No exhibitor, their immediate family, or any other party involved in unethical practices shall be permitted to exhibit at the Wood County Fair, having been banned for disciplinary or ethical reasons from other county, independent, or state fairs for a period commensurate with the ban.
- Disciplinary action by a sponsor against a person for a violation of sections 901.70 through 901.76, inclusive, or 2925.04 of the Revised Code or chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code shall be given full faith and credit and shall be honored at all exhibitions.
- 4. A person who has been convicted of violating section 901.70 through 901.76, inclusive, or 2925.04 of the Revised Code or chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code shall be prohibited from participating in any exhibition for a minimum period of three years.

ONLINE ADD ON SALE

- All Jr. Fair Livestock and Equine exhibitors who complete and exhibit their project at the fair will be eligible for the Online Add On Sale. New in 2025 this includes ALL ANIMAL projects.
- In order to participate in the Online Add On Sale exhibitors must register on Fair Entry by the June 1 deadline. No Late entries will be accepted.
- 3. The Online Sale will begin no later than 8:00 am the Monday immediately following the fair and conclude no earlier than 5:00 pm the Friday immediately following the fair.
- This is an add-on only sale in which any buyer can participate.
- Buyers must register through Fair Entry, and can be accessed via the fair's website or by calling the Fair Office.

GENERAL RULES

- 1. All exhibitors selling their market animal(s) to the Sr. Fairboard (via the market truck), participating in the Online Add On Sale or participating in the Livestock Showcase Sale will be charged 2% commision for administrative fees.
- Only animals shown and judged at the fair are eligible to be sold to the Sr. Fairboard (via the market truck).
- The Livestock Showcase Sale order will be determined and managed by the Livestock Sale committee.
- All Grand and Reserve Champions will be sold and go to slaughter at a Fair Board designated slaughter facility. Market price will be paid for these animals. Exceptions are beef feeders, dairy feeders, dairy crossbred feeders, rabbits, and poultry.
- Exhibitors will receive notification when checks are available for pick up at the Fair Office and a pick up date will be set. Checks will be mailed 14 days following the posted pick up date.
- All sale payments must be received in the fair office by August 29th, 2025. Any invoices not paid by August 29 will have their credit card on file charged and the credit card processing fee is the responsibility of the card holder.
- 7. All feeder calves must be paid for prior to leaving the grounds. You must show a paid invoice to the Dept. Superintendent or approved Committee Member before loading any animal.
- Pictures will be taken of all champion exhibits for publicity purposes. Date and time will be announced during each show.
- The state mandated species (beef, pork, sheep) check off fees will be assessed and deducted from exhibitor market checks.

SPECIAL SALE CONSIDERATIONS BY SPECIES

SHEEP - The Ohio Sheep checkoff of ½ of 1% of the value of the sheep or lambs sold (market value X \$0.005) will be deducted from exhibitor's checks where sheep are sold through the Fair Board for market price. The Fair Board provides one remittance to the Ohio Sheep Improvement Association for all swine sold at the fair. SWINE - The National Pork checkoff of \$0.0035 of gross market value per head sold will be deducted (GMV x \$0.0035) from exhibitor's checks where swine are sold through the fair board for market price. The Fair Board provides one remittance to the National Pork Board for all swine sold at the fair.

MARKET STEER/MARKET HEIFER/DAIRY STEERS - Cattle sold at the Fair will deducted from final checks for beef checkoff. The Fair have \$2.00 per head Board provides one remittance to the Ohio Beef Council for all cattle sold at the fair. BEEF FEEDERS/DAIRY FEEDERS / DAIRY CROSS FEEDERS - All feeders will be sold to determine market price Saturday, August 2, 2025 beginning at 9:00 am in the Pavilion show arena. Sale ring bids on Sunday will be premium only.

Awards for Grand and Reserve will be announced at the Livestock Showcase and Sale. Additional awards and placings to 5th place will be recognized at the 4-H Spirit Night.

Requirements:

Skillathon participation is required to be eliqible for Champion Project.

All Skillathon scores will be raw scores for all departments.

All departments will have a Junior and Senior Champion Project except Dairy.

The following are not awarded project points:

- Rate of Gain
- County Born and Raised
- Supreme Poultry Exhibit
- Best of Show Rabbit
- Novice Horse

Tiebreaker for all departments:

- 1. Highest Skillathon score
- 2. Highest showmanship score (horses highest championship score)
- 3. Oldest exhibitor

Project Scoring

Beef/Sheep/Poultry/Rabbit: Jr and Sr Divisions

- 1. Skillathon Raw Score 100 pts.
- 2. Livestock Interview
 - In Person Participation 50 pts.
- 3. Showmanship top 5 placing in finals class

1st place - 50 pts., 2nd place - 40 pts., 3rd place - 30 pts., 4th place - 20 pts., 5th place - 10 pts.



RULES FOR MARKET HEIFER

Market Heifers will show first in a Division of their own (CBR & OOC together.) Top 5 overall will be placed but only Grand and Reserve Champion will be eligible for the Overall Final Drive.

COUNTY BORN & RAISED AND OUT OF COUNTY SHOW

CBR Market Steers will show together and a Top 5 will be selected. Then we will move into the OOC Market Steers show. Top 5 will be selected. Then the top 2 Market Heifers, Top 5 CBR and Top 5 OOC will then show together for the Overall Top 5 Market animal.

GENERAL BEEF RULES

- All Market and Feeder Beef Animals MUST have an RFID ear tag prior to arrival at the fairgrounds on July 26th.
- ODA Livestock Exhibition Rules and Requirements for all livestock can be found in the Health Regulations and Inspection of Livestock section of the book.
- 3. All Jr. Fair Beef Animals must be on the fairgrounds and tied with neckties in their properly assigned stall by 6:00 p.m. on Saturday July 26th.
- Stall assignments will be made by the Jr. & Sr. Fair Superintendents. You
 may not change your stall assignment. If there is an issue contact the Jr. Fair
 Coordinator as soon as possible.
- No straw or bedding allowed in the barn; mulch will be provided. Exhibitors may be charged a fee if donations are not secured to cover costs.
- All barn rules will be observed daily. Important announcements will be posted on the department bulletin board.
- All cattle must be dry when weighed.
- Exhibitors may only win 1 rate of gain trophy per beef project (Ex: 1 market beef, 1 dairy/crossbred dairy beef & 1 beef feeder) and only qualify for rate of gain, if they weighed in at the May ID day.
- A mandatory barn meeting will be held prior to the fair weigh-in. All exhibitors must be present.
- Exhibitors must complete the online DUNF form for each market beef and feeder calf brought to the fair. They need to be filled out prior to weigh-in on Saturday, July 26th.
- 11. Exhibitors will be required to designate all beef projects in Fair Entry as either: Going Home, Market Truck or Feeder Sale. Changes can be made during Saturdays weigh-in but there will be no changes after that.
- 12. Breed papers for the Breeding Heifers will be required and must be brought with the animal to the scales immediately following weigh-in to be verified by the beef committee. If an exhibitor is unable to provide the proper registration papers, the animal will be put into a crossbred class.
- 13. Any animal born after Jan. 1 must be shown with feeder classes. Animals born prior to Jan 1 must be shown with market animals.
- 14. No market heifer may be shown in the breeding classes. No breeding heifer may be shown in market classes. Animals can only be shown in one Class.
- 15. All Beef Cattle must be halter broken and shown with halters.
- 16. The limit on the number of times an exhibitor's animal can get loose in the show ring is two. If it gets loose a third time, the exhibitor will be excused from competition
- 17. Showmanship Contests for all divisions will expect cattle to be clean and dried.
- 18. Only the exhibitor and the animal they are showing shall be permitted in the staging area.
- Grand/Reserve Champion and 3rd-5th place will be picked for each Division including breeding heifers, market heifers, dairy steers, CBR market steers, OOC market steers, beef feeders, dairy beef feeders, crossbred dairy feeders and Overall market animal.
- 20. When placing the top 5 in each division, if the exhibitor is called to the ring and doesn't show, he/she will be skipped and next in line will move up.
- 21. Showmanship classes will be limited to one animal per exhibitor. Exhibitors with entries in breeding, feeder calf or steer/heifer classes must choose the one animal to enter in showmanship. This designation must be made in Fair Entry by June 1, but you may switch classes at the July 26th weigh-in. No changes will be made after that. Exhibitors must show their own animal.
- Paint or any other type of color enhancements will not be permissible for grooming, including hooves. Animals can be disqualified if added color is found.



- 23. Any animal will be disqualified if the body or appendages are altered in any way. *The Wood Co. Agricultural Society shall have the right to require any animal (specifically the Champion & Reserve Champion of all Beef classes & showmanship classes) be subject to examination or tests to determine if a substance has been administered to the animal to change the conformation or temperament of the animal.
- 24. If an exhibitor decides to remove their animal(s) from the fairgrounds for any reason, they will not be permitted to return to the fairgrounds. This means no sale or premium! Exemption to participate in Wood County add on sale if the exhibitor is participating in an official Ohio State Fair Jr Fair show.
- 25. If no beef project is shown at the fair may not participate in the add on sale.
- 26. The only fans allowed in the beef barns will be hanging. All floor fans must be approved by the Sr. Fair Beef Committee.
- 27. No couches or furniture of any kind will be allowed in the building.
- The Jr. & Sr. Fair Beef Superintendents will make final decisions on any rules not covered.

RULES FOR MARKET STEERS/HEIFERS & DAIRY STEERS

- Each 4-H and FFA Member may show a maximum of 2 steers/heifers at the Wood County Junior Fair.
- An exhibitor may weigh up to 3 market steers/heifers prior to the fair but may only bring 2 to the fair.
- All 4-H and FFA market steers/heifers must be identified, on feed, and in the members immediate possession and daily care by the December weigh in. All cattle must be dehorned and properly healed by show. (Smooth healed)
- 4. Dairy steers will be divided into show classes by weight at the discretion of the Jr. & Sr. Fair Board. Market Steers and Market Heifers will be divided into show classes by weight at the discretion of the Boards. Both market steers and heifers and dairy steers will be weighed on the first day of the fair. There will be an option for 1 reweigh immediately following the first weigh. The second weight taken will be the published sale weight.
- The Overall Grand/Reserve Champions must go on the market truck and be slaughtered by the packer determined by the fair board.
- Dairy Steers must be of a dairy breed or a cross of dairy breeds. (Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey)

RULES FOR DAIRY BEEF FEEDERS, CROSSBRED DAIRY BEEF FEEDERS AND BEEF FEEDERS

- All Feeder Calves must be identified, on feed, and in the member's immediate possession and daily care by the May ID day.
 - May ID Day is MANDATORY for all Dairy, Crossbred Dairy and Beef Feeders. ALL FEEDERS must come in and have RFID tags verified.
 - May Weigh-In is OPTIONAL for any feeders wishing to participate in the Rate of Gain contest.
- All dairy and crossbred dairy feeders will be evaluated at the May ID/Weigh in.
 If determined to be a crossbred dairy feeder and the exhibitor disagrees, they do reserve the right to submit a DNA test to determine the calf to be a purebred dairy feeder at their own expense. DNA tests must be submitted by the July 26 check in at the fair.
- 3. All exhibitors of dairy and crossbred dairy beef feeders will be charged up to \$10 for a treatment to ensure healthy calves upon leaving the fairgrounds. This shot will be given at the May ID Day. Vet fees for these shots must be paid at the May ID day. Cash or check will be accepted.
- 4. Exhibitors may show a maximum of two dairy beef feeders or crossbred dairy beef feeders and/or two beef feeders in the Wood County Junior Fair. Exhibitors may initially weigh-in 3 dairy beef feeders or crossbred dairy beef feeders and/or 3 beef feeders in case of calamity.
- 5. Only male dairy animals may be used for dairy/crossbred dairy beef feeder projects. Calves must be castrated by May ID day. Any feeders showing evidence of testicular tissue as determined by the beef department superintendent and fair veterinarian will be removed from the fairgrounds and are therefore ineligible for awards. Beef Feeder Calves may be of any beef breed or cross between any beef breeds.
- Dairy Beef Feeder Calves must be of any dairy breed or cross between dairy breeds (Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey). Beef Feeders must be purebred or a mix of beef breeds.
- All feeder calves must be dehorned by May ID day. Exhibitors will be notified if their animal is ineligible.
- 8. Dairy Beef Feeder and Crossbred Dairy Beef Feeder Calves will be shown at the fair in weight classes of approximately ten calves each. Weight divisions will be based upon weigh-in weight of the first day of the fair. There will be an option for 1 reweigh immediately following the first weight. The second weight taken will be the published sale weight.

- Exhibitors are responsible for daily care of their projects, including, but not limited to feeding, watering, cleaning pens and aisles and manure management (all manure must be dumped in appropriate areas). - Crossbred Market Hogs: Barrows and Gilts will show together and we will then pick a Champion Crossbred Market Hog
- Champion Drive for Overall Breeding Gilt and Overall Market Hog

Jr. Fair Weigh In Process:

- 1. Weigh in will begin at 3 pm following the barn meeting at 2:45 pm
- We will start with Breeding Gilts.
 - a. You will be called up by Club and then in breed order one at a time to make it easier to check pedigrees and breed characteristics
 - b. After we get through all the breeds in that Club we will then have crossbreds in that Club come to the ring and to have ear notches checked and be
 - i. Example of how it will be announced: "Any Berkshire breeding gilts in Simply Stock please come to the ring"
- 3. After all the breeding gilts in every club have been completed we will follow the same process for the market hogs
- The club order we will go in will be decided and posted at least 2 weeks prior to weigh in day.

GENERAL RULES

- 1. All Junior Fair Livestock Rules apply.
- All hogs MUST have RFID ear tags when you arrive at fairgrounds
- All exhibitors should be in possession of their project animals by May 25. Online entry via Fair Entry is due June 1. Swine identification will be three pictures of each pig enrolled in Fair Entry. The pictures are one of each side (two total side pictures) and a headshot clearly showing the ear notches. All pictures will be required to be uploaded to Fair Entry at the time the exhibitor is entering fair classes.
 - a. No one animal(s) may be enrolled by more than one exhibitor, except for siblings (full, half or step), who may enter the same animal(s) separately in Fair Entry.
 - b. Exhibitors entering in the Wood County Born and Raised market hog contest must identify those animals by uploading a copy of the sales receipt clearly identifying the address of the farm the pig was born on into Fair
- 4. Exhibitors may show a maximum of 6 hogs, any combination of market hogs. commercial hogs and gilts for a total of 6 hogs. Gilts can only be entered as either market or breeding, not both.

- 5. This is a partial-terminal show. Grand champion overall and reserve grand champion overall market hogs will be harvested. All other market hogs will either:
 - a. Sell directly to market via the Fair Board provided truck on Sunday night
 - b. Be self transported home for custom harvest

HEALTH AND CARE OF PROJECT:

- ODA Livestock Exhibition Rules and Requirements for all livestock can be found in the Health Regulations and Inspection of Livestock section of the book
- The fair veterinarian is the only person(s) who may possess and administer controlled substances in the swine barn.
- 3. Ractopamine/Paylean is allowed at the 2025 Wood County Fair.
- 4. Exhibitors are responsible for daily care of their projects, including, but not limited to feeding, watering, cleaning pens and manure management (all manure must be dumped in appropriate areas). Failure to maintain a healthy and humane environment may result in disciplinary action, which could include forfeiture of premium monies, ability to participate in the online add on sale or expulsion from the show or future shows.
- 5. No straw for bedding in the pens.
- Water is the only acceptable topical substance to be used on show day. Example: oils, powders, or paints are unacceptable. If a substance is found, the hog will be disqualified from the show.
- 7. Pens must be cleaned out on the last day of fair (this includes tack pens). Pen Mats must be picked up and placed on the skid outside the barn. Once completed the exhibitor must check out with the designated fair personnel. Failure to do so will result in loss of the ability to participate in the add on sale.

ADDITIONAL NOTES:

- In instances where a packer may assess a fee for reasons related to added slaughter procedures, the fee will be incurred by the exhibitor. Warning: Shaved pigs have a higher than average chance of incurring added slaughter charges.
 - a. Hogs may not be clipped shorter than ½ inch.

BREEDING GILTS:

- 1. Breeding gilts must be farrowed on or after December 1 of the prior year
- Purebred breeding gilts will show by age within their respective breed. Purebred gilts must come to the ring to have purebred papers and breed characteristics checked but do not need to go through the scale.
- Crossbred breeding gilts will show by weight, they must be weighed in during weigh in
- 4. Maximum weight for crossbred breeding gilts will be 325 lbs
- Breeding gilts are eligible for online add on and may be consigned to market or retained.
- Grand Champion, Reserve Champion, Third Overall, Fourth Overall, and Fifth Overall breeding gilt will be selected.
 - a. Champion and Reserve, 3, 4 and 5 out of each breed will be selected and eligible for Top 5 Overall Breeding Gilt honors.

PUREBRED HOGS:

- Breeds will be offered for both breeding and market classes. Exhibitors may exhibit any breed with an established registry in the United States (Berkshire, Chester White, Duroc, Hampshire, Hereford, Landrace, Poland China, Spot, Tamworth and Yorkshire) or Crossbreds.
 - · There will be no minimum requirement for a breed to be offered
- Purebred registration papers for purebred barrows and gilts are required. They MUST be presented during fair weigh-in or pigs will show as crossbreds. Registration papers and breed characteristics will be evaluated during the fair weigh-in process.
 - Ownership information on pedigree(s) must match the name of the exhibitor
 at the Wood County Fair. Farm names, failing to explicitly list the exhibitor,
 are not acceptable for establishing proof of ownership. If John Doe is
 showing at the fair, John Doe must be listed as an owner on the pedigree.
 - Example: Doe Family Farms fails to explicitly establish John Doe as an owner and is not acceptable.
 - Example: Doe Family Farms: John Doe, Jane Doe and Julie Doe, explicitly establishes John as an owner and is acceptable.
 - Ear notches on pedigree(s) must match the pig being exhibited.
 - Any pigs failing to meet pedigree or breed characteristic requirements (according to their respective breed association) will show as crossbreds.
 - Swine Committee decisions related to pedigree and breed characteristic requirements are considered final.
 - Purebred paperwork must show ownership date of no later than May 25th, 2025.
- Purebred breeding gilts will show by birthdate and purebred market hogs will show by weight only (barrows and gilts together)

COMMERCIAL HOGS:

- Only 15 members selected through the application process will be allowed to participate in this class.
- 2. Each member selected will be allowed to show up to 2 animals in this class.
- All animals for this class will come from a breeder selected by the swine committee. No outside hogs will be allowed to show in this class.
- 4. All Commercial hogs must weigh between 270-320 lbs
- Hogs may be re-weighed only if their weight is less than 270 lbs. Re-weighing must take place immediately and will be the final weight.
- Hogs weighing less than 270 lbs. will show in the crossbred market hog class and will follow their rules.
- The maximum commercial weight is 320 lbs. Hogs weighing more than 320 will show in an exhibition class but will not be eligible for grand champion or the premium sale.
- 8. Grand Champion, Reserve Champion, Third Overall, Fourth Overall, and Fifth Overall Commercial Hogs will be selected.

MARKET HOGS:

- All market hogs must weigh between 210-290 lbs to be eligible for champion animal consideration.
- Hogs may be re-weighed only if their weight is less than 210 lbs. Re-weighing must take place immediately and will be the final weight.
- 3. Hogs weighing less than 210 lbs. will show in an exhibition class but will not be eligible for champion competition.
- The maximum market weight is 290 lbs. Hogs weighing more than 290 will show in an exhibition class but will not be eligible for champion consideration.
- Crossbred market hogs will show by sex and weight barrows and gilts show separately.
- Grand Champion, Reserve Champion, Third Overall, Fourth Overall, and Fifth Overall Market Hogs will be selected.

SWINE RELEASE: Sunday, August 3rd time TBD

- Animals going on the Market Truck If available, please help load your animals onto the market truck.
- Any animal entered as going home will be permitted to begin the load out process a half an hour after the start of the main grandstand entertainment on the last night of the fair. Please see the Livestock release section of the Jr. Fair Rules
- 3. Animals leaving for the Ohio State Fair will need to be out of the barn and after 11 pm on Monday before 8 am on Tuesday. All trucks and trailers must enter through gate A on Haskins Rd and load on the track. No trailers should be on the midway or by the pavilion. Exhibitors must follow the check out procedure to be permitted to participate in the online add on sale. You MUST provide a paid entry receipt to be released for the State Fair
- 4. Breeding gilts will be released at the same time as the Ohio State Fair Hogs.
- 5. All other hogs MUST remain in the barn until the last day of the fair release.

- Pen of 3 and Single Fryer Weigh-in: Saturday July 26th, 9:00am-11:00am
- · Mandatory Barn Meeting: Saturday, July 26th, 11:00am
- Breed/Market judging: Tuesday, July 29th, 12:00pm will be shown in the sheep show arena.
- · Rabbit Showmanship: Tuesday, July 29th following the breed market show.
- Rabbit Meat buyer will be at the Poultry Barn Saturday Aug 2nd Prior to showmanship sweepstakes if available.

No health certificate is required, but animals must be free of disease and parasites. Show officials reserve the right to ask for removal of animals deemed a health threat to other show animals.

GENERAL RULES:

- Participation is limited to 4-H and FFA members enrolled in rabbit projects in 2025.
- Entries must be made in Fair entry by June 1st @ 11:59pm. Showmanship
 will also need to be signed up in Fair entry at the time of entries, any entries
 after this date will be subjected to a late fee of \$50.00 The fee will be increased
 to \$100 after July 15th any entries after this date will not be eligible for grand or
 reserve champion.

New for 2025 all animals including breeding and market are eligible for the add on sale, you must be registered in fair entry with a photo and bio to be included in the add on sale. Deadline is also June 1st.

- Judging will be based on ARBA standards.
- Exhibitors must follow project requirements and may enter any combination up to 6 entries(cages). Market classes will count as 1 entry. If you show Meat Pen and Single Fryer that is 2 entries. Doe and Litter will be counted as 1 entry.
- Crossbreed rabbits may not be shown. Rabbits with obvious deformities or diseases should not be brought to the fair.
- Breeding Exhibitors must be in possession, have ownership, and complete showing rights to rabbits on June 1.

- All rabbits, including Market, must attend ID Day on June 25th, at the Fairgrounds Rabbit Barn from 5:30-7:30pm. Those rabbits not identified are not eligible to show. All rabbits must have a tattoo on ID Day. Doe and litter are not required on ID Day, but the doe must have a tattoo.
- 9. After identification day, any animal having been substituted for any reason is ineligible for show. - The fair veterinarian is the only person(s) who may possess and administer controlled substances to an animal.
- 3. Exhibitors are responsible for daily care of their projects, including, but not limited to feeding, watering, cleaning pens and aisles and manure management (all manure must be dumped in appropriate areas). Failure to maintain a healthy and humane environment may result in disciplinary action, which could include forfeiture of premium monies, ability to participate in the online add on sale or expulsion from the show or future shows.
- 4. Water is the only acceptable topical substance to be used on show day. Example: oils, powders, or paints are unacceptable. If a substance is found, the goat will be disqualified from the show.

Failure to maintain a healthy and humane environment may result in disciplinary action, which could include forfeiture of premium monies, ability to participate in the online add on

GENERAL SHEEP DEPARTMENT RULES

- 1. All Junior Fair Livestock Rules apply.
- Exhibitors must complete the online DUNF form for each market lamb and it must be filled out prior to weigh-in on Saturday, July 26th.
- The pen tag that is placed on the pen by the Junior Fair Shall be visible at all times. This tag is not to be removed. If there is an issue with your pen assignment, contact the Jr. Fair Coordinator as soon as possible.
- No barn decorations until Friday, July 25. Once pen assignments are on pens, do not move them.
- 5. Tack space will be shared.
- No pen gates may be removed.
- 7. Do not tamper with another exhibitor's sheep or pens.
- All Jr. Fair Sheep exhibitors are required to show their projects in the proper classification.
- 9. The same animal cannot be entered and shown in both a market lamb class and breeding sheep class.
- 10. Drug testing will be done on Champion and Reserve Champion Market Lambs.
- 11. If a sheep/lamb is brought to the Wood Co. Fair, it must be shown in a minimum of 1 class
- 12. The Junior Fair Dress Code will be in effect for all sheep exhibitors.
- 13. All sheep (market & breeding) must have an Individual Identification ear tag (Scrapie) in place for exhibition at the Wood County Fair. Market lambs must have a scrapie tag in place prior to the April ID day. Tagging should be done by the producer of your lamb to help track Scrapie disease outbreaks.
- 14. Exhibitors may use the bedding of their choice. Shavings are recommended. All pens must be bedded. Carpeting will be allowed only if the following conditions are met:
 - No excess carpet may stick past the edge of the pen in either the pedestrian aisle or the exhibitor's aisle.
 - All carpet edges must be taped down to eliminate the problem of tripping over loose edges.
 - All carpet must have either straw or shavings under the carpet to absorb moisture and reduce odor.
 - d. All carpet must be removed from the pen at the conclusion of the fair and must be taken home.
- 15. If a project lamb dies, is injured or unable to show, an identified substitute lamb may be shown in its place. Contact the Dept. Supt. in the event this happens. No substitute animal will show in any of the Champion Classes, but it may be used for showmanship.
- 16. All lambs must have water provided to them continuously at all times. A pink slip will be issued as a warning. A second pink slip will result in disqualification of championship for all lambs in specified pen.
- 17. Special Showing & Grooming Guidelines: Special note to Junior Fair Guidelines: No physical tampering of animal or misconduct by the exhibitor or any individual inside or outside of the showring will be tolerated. The use of muzzles on lambs is prohibited while on the Wood County Fairgrounds. The use of artificial coloring, painting, or changing the breed qualities of a lamb shall be considered fraud and deception and will not be permitted at the Wood County Fair
- 18. Exhibitors must comply with Chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code (Ohio Livestock Tampering Exhibition Rules), specifically 901-19-12 and 901-19-13, the Acceptable Practices and Unacceptable Practices. All towels and blankets must be removed from the animal and remain off during the time period from 15 minutes prior to the show to the end of the show. Drenching is prohibited. Drenching is defined as "the act of using an instrument (including a bottle, syringe, scoop, or your hand) placed in the animal's mouth to orally administer a liquid, food, or any other substance."
- 19. All sheep must be shown clean and DRY.
- 20. When sheep are being handled by the judge, all 4 feet of the animal must remain on the ground. A pink slip will be issued as a first warning. Second slip is disqualification for that animal.
- 21. The Wood County Agricultural Society shall have the right to require any animal be subject to examination or tests to determine if a substance has been administered to the animal to change the conformation or temperament of the animal.

JUNIOR FAIR MARKET LAMB RULES

- 1. Market lamb exhibitors may show up to 3 single market lambs.
- 2. The Wood County Fair is a slick sheared market lamb show. All lambs must be slick shorn within a week of the fair with a 13-tooth comb or less and washed by weigh-in time. Head wool is allowed at weigh in. Lambs will be allowed leg wool from the knees and hocks down. Belly and flank wool must be completely shorn and equal to the length of wool on the body at the time of the show. Belly and flank wool will be monitored prior to selection of champion. Lambs will move up in a class if eliminated for belly or flank wool not equal to the length of the wool on the body.
- 3. County Born and Raised Market Contest Rules- Exhibitors entering the County Born and Raised Market Lamb Contest must identify those animals in Fair Entry by submitting a bill of sale showing the address where the animal was born. If the animal was born on the home farm and not purchased elsewhere, you still must submit a document showing the address of where the animal was hom.
- If you want to be part of the County Born and Raised Classes you must select the appropriate division in Fair Entry.
- All Grand & Reserve Champion Market Lambs must be sold to the Sr. Fair Board and not be returned home for breeding purposes or go to other shows. They will be slaughtered at a place determined by the Fairboard.
- 6. Signs will be posted to show the different classes. If two animals belonging to the same exhibitor fall into the same weight class, the exhibitor has the option to shift the heavier animal to the next higher weight class or select another Wood County Junior Fair exhibitor to show their animal in the same class.

ENTRY RULES

- 1. All exhibits must meet the health requirements listed on page 6 of this fair book.
- 2. All chickens and turkeys brought to the Wood County Fair must either:
 - a. Come from a hatchery that is a participant in the National Poultry Improvement Plan and exhibitor has form NPIP-15 from the hatchery.
 - Be tested prior to the fair as negative for Pullorum or fowl typhoid by a licensed tester and have a copy of Form NPIP-15 to turn in at check-in; or
 - Be tested at the fair during check-in by a licensed tester. No Turkeys will be tested at the Fairgrounds.
- A copy of form NPIP-15 can be uploaded into Fair Entry or MUST be turned in at the poultry check-in on Saturday, July 26th, from 12-2 pm for all chickens, and turkeys. Waterfowl (ducks and geese) do not require NPIP-15 form.
- Entries are limited to one (1) pen per section as outlined in the Sections and Classes, except for:
 - a. Exhibition Specialty Birds exhibitors may take two (2) pens, must be in different classes.
 - b. Exhibition Waterfowl exhibitors may take two (2) pens, must be in different classes.
 - c. Fancy Poultry exhibitors may take two (2) pens, must be in different classes.
- All birds must be in possession by the date specified for the Class and property of the exhibitor
- 6. The Show is divided into two parts:
 - a. Wednesday Judging through interview at cage by judge
 - b. Thursday Showmanship Sr./ Jr.
- Showmanship Age divisions are: Seniors 14-18, Juniors 8-13. There will be an overall champion Jr. and Sr. Showman. There will be banners for 1st-5th place in both the Jr. and Sr. Division. The 1st place Senior Showman will represent the Poultry Department in the Showmanship Sweepstakes.
- Exhibitors of meat chickens, market ducks, market geese, meat turkeys
 must participate in the Quality Assurance training program no less than
 45 days prior to show (no later than June 12, 2025). <u>DUNF forms must
 be completed through online enrollment only. Exhibitors are required to
 provide a copy of NPIP paperwork for all birds except Waterfowl.</u>
- Champion and Reserve Champion meat chickens, market ducks, market geese, and meat turkeys must sell at the Livestock Showcase and Sale. The show and sale are non-terminal for all poultry classes. Exhibitors are responsible for taking their project home from the fair and obtaining a processing appointment (if needed).
- 10. Care of Poultry: All exhibitors are responsible for the feeding, watering & bedding of their poultry or fowl. Failure to do so will result in the following:
 - a. First warning. Written warning.
 - b. Second warning loss of premium.
 - Third warning removal from the grounds, forfeiture of awards, and loss of show privileges for the following year.
- 11. Waters and feeders securely fastened to the cage 2 inches above bedding. Exhibitors must check the condition of pens, food, and water several times a day!
- Replacement of poultry due to injury or disease is permitted at the discretion of the Junior Fair Poultry Committee. Pens with replacement animals are ineligible for awards at judging.

- 13. All Junior Fair exhibitors must follow the Wood County Junior Fair Dress Code for all judging and shows. Long sleeve white shirt or lab coat. Jeans not torn or ripped. Closed toed shoes. Members will practice good sportsmanship and show ethics.
- Cages must be cleaned DAILY- and MUST be cleaned before final removal from the barn.

New For 2025: Exhibitors must "sign out" with barn official after final cleaning or forfeit premium.

Sections and Classes (Premium for Exhibition \$3.00 per pen)

Section A: Pen of Two Meat Chickens – Exhibit Meat breeds only and may only enter 1 class. Judging will be based on the market capabilities and similarities between birds of the pen. Both birds in the pen must meet the required weight to be eligible to place in the Class.

- Fryers Two birds, 4.0 5.5 lbs. each (possession by June 16, 6-8 weeks old).
 Max pen weight = 11 lbs. Any pens overweight will be shown in Roaster class.
- 2. Roasters 5.5 8.0 lbs. each (possession by June 4, 8-10 weeks old) Max pen weight = 16 lbs.

Section B: Pen of Two Laying Chickens – Exhibit laying breeds only and may only enter 1 class. Judging will be based on the egg laying potential/capabilities and similarities between birds of the pen.

- Pullets Two birds, 6 months of age and under, not yet laying eggs (possessions by June 1st). Any pens that begin to lay prior to the fair will be moved to the hen class.
- Hens Two birds, over 6 months of age (possession by May 1st). Last year's pullets may be brought back as hens.

Section C: Single Meat Turkey – Exhibit meat breeds only. Exhibitor is allowed to enter 1 class. Judging will be based on the market capabilities. Bird must meet the required weight to be eligible to place in the class.

- 1. Toms One bird, 15 35 lbs (possession by May 1st, 13 15 weeks old)
- 2. Hens One bird, 15 35 lbs (possession by May 1st, 16 18 weeks old)

*Disclaimer: Birds over 35 lbs are difficult to process when brought to market and processors may refuse or add extra fees.

Section D: Pen of Two Exhibition Specialty – May enter up to two (2) different classes. Judging will be based on the ideal bird for each class and similarities between birds of the pen. Possession by June 1st for all classes. Two birds of the same breed: one male and one female preferred.

Section E: Pen of Two Exhibition Waterfowl – Exhibition breeds only (no meat breeds) and may enter up to two (2) different classes. Judging will be based on the APA Standard of Perfection for each breed. Possession by June 1st for all classes. Two birds of the same breed: one male and one female preferred.

1. Exhibition Ducks

2. Exhibition Geese

Section F: Pen of Two Market Fowl – Exhibit meat breeds only and may enter up to two (2) different classes. Judging will be based on the market capabilities and similarities between birds of the pen. Both birds in the pen must meet the required weight to be eligible to place in the Class.

- 1. Market Geese Two birds, 9-13 lbs each (possession by May 20, 70-90 days old).
- 2. Market Ducks Two birds, 6-8 lbs each (possession by June 9, 45-55 days old).

Section G: Pen of Two Fancy Poultry – May enter up to two (2) different classes. Judging will be based on the APA Standard of Perfection for each breed. Possession by June 1st for all classes. Two birds of the same breed: one male and one female preferred.

DEPARTMENT RULES

- Each division official will expect courteous and orderly conduct by exhibitors and spectators. Harassment, profanity or unsportsmanlike conduct toward fair officials, judges, show manager, help or exhibitors shall not be tolerated. Any violations of this rule would warrant withholding of premiums won and exemption of showing at the Wood County Fair. Violators may be removed from the fairgrounds.
- All exhibitors, parents, and public must abide by the rules of the Junior and Senior Fair or will be asked to leave the grounds, forfeit any premiums and awards, and will be subject to further sanctions appropriate to the offending
- In order for a protest to be brought forth it shall be put in writing along with \$100.00 and brought forth to the committee.
- The Rules Committee is the Rules Committee on the Sr. and Jr. Fair Board.
- The Jr. Fair members will act as the show steward during the week along with the assistance of the Horse Advisors and Sr. Fair Board Directors.
- The only people allowed in the Entry Booth will be working advisors and Jr. Fair Board members. The only people allowed upstairs will be the people working. All questions should be answered downstairs. Anyone making a nuisance of themselves will be asked to leave the fairgrounds.

DEPARTMENT J-E -HORSES & PONIES - ENTRY RULES

- Jr. Fair Judging will be in accordance with publication No. 179 Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows.
- 2. ** All youth age 19 and under, participating in any 4-H equestrian activity, are required to wear properly fitted protective headgear which meets or exceeds current ASTM (American Society for Testing and Materials)/SEI (Safety Equipment Institute) standards with the chin harness securely fastened at all times while riding or driving an equine. It is the responsibility of the rider, or the parent or guardian of the youth participant, to make sure that the headgear worn complies with appropriate safety standards

- for protective headgear intended for equestrian use and is properly fitted and in good condition. The Ohio 4-H Horse Program, Show Committees, Officials, Extension Personnel and Volunteer Leaders are not responsible for checking headgear worn for such compliance.
- ** The Ohio 4-H Horse Program, Show Committees, Officials, Extension Personnel and Volunteer Leaders make no representation or warranty, expressed or implied, about any protective headgear, and cautions riders that death or serious injury may result despite wearing such headgear, as no helmet can protect against all foreseeable injuries in equestrian activities.
- ** The Ohio 4-H Horse Program, Show Committees, Officials, Extension Personnel and Volunteer Leaders may, at his/her discretion, check a participant's protective headgear for proper standards. If the youth is found to be wearing unapproved, defective, or improperly fitted headgear, he/she will not be permitted to participate in riding or driving activities until proper headgear is acquired.
- Any complaints or protests must be filed according to The Ohio State University Extension Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows No. 179R article 20 under General Rules on pg. 8 which states as follows:
 - A. Complaints will be handled through the show steward, who will clarify rules and arrange for the exhibitor to visit with the judge if the steward feels the request is justified.
 - B. If any complaint cannot be resolved at the steward level, a written protest should be filed with show management.
 - Protests must be made in writing and signed by the party or parties making the protest.
 - A \$100.00 fee must accompany the protest. The fee will be retained by the show management and used to pay the costs of investigating the protest.
 - 3) The protest and fee must be filed with the show manager the same day of the show. The protest will be considered at the time designated by the show manager and will include the accused, the accuser, an Extension representative, and any other needed parties. If any party cannot attend, a representative must be sent.
 - A judge's decision on how a class is placed, or a decision on disqualification of an exhibitor based on the judge's interpretation of the rules for that class, shall not be protested.
 - C. The show manager has the right to prohibit an exhibitor from showing if there is evidence that the exhibitor has violated 4-H horse show rules that would make the exhibitor ineliaible to show.
- 4. Judges' decision is final and non-disputable.
- Unsportsmanlike conduct towards judges, show management or exhibitors, or physical abuse of the project horse will not be tolerated. Violators will be dismissed from the show and/or subject to further actions.
- 6. The judge will dismiss from the ring, any entry he/she feels is unruly or not in sufficient control for the safety of the handler or other exhibitors.
- Health requirements for the Horse Department are found in the front of the fair book.
- All Junior Fair horse members, while at the fair, are governed by Jr. & Sr. Fair Board.
- Any Exhibitor, parent or advisor that suspects any horse to be given any substance that is not legal must let a senior fair board member know and the senior fair board member will address the situation.
- The project grade will be determined by considering the performance abilities of the members.
- All divisions of English Showmanship, English Equitation, Western Showmanship, Western Horsemanship, Ranch Showmanship and Ranch Horsemanship classes will be graded A+, A, B, or C.
- Specialty classes and Horseless Horse classes will be placed 1-5 like a regular show and will NOT receive grades.
- Walk-Trot classes are considered specialty classes. Walk-Trot exhibitors are not eligible for any other canter/lope classes and not eligible for Championship classes.
- 14. All divisions of English Showmanship, English Equitation, Western Showmanship, Western Horsemanship, Ranch Showmanship and Ranch Horsemanship Championship classes are filled with those who have received an A+ in their appropriate class. Draft Showmanship, Intermediate Western Reining and all divisions of Barrels, Poles, Keyhole and Stakes Championship classes are placed on qualifying run and best score or time.
- 15. Only one premium will be paid per project animal.
- Every equine exhibitor is required to enter fair classes online using FairEntry.
 Permission to participate form will be uploaded in FairEntry. Horse ID, lease

- papers and photos will also be uploaded to FairEntry. Deadline is June 1!
- 17. Each horse must have an ID and 4 current year photos of the animal. The photos should be a view that shows the full body, face and all 4 legs with no saddle: 1 photo of each side, the front and back views.
- 18. Exhibitor may enter a maximum number of two (2) light horses or ponies or two (2) draft horse/pony or two (2) small equine or a combination of the three types up to but not more than three (3) projects in the Jr. Fair Horse Show. (For example: 2 light horse and 1 draft or 2 light horse and 1 small equine or 2 draft and 1 light horse or 2 small equine and 1 draft.) If the draft project is shown in any draft horse/pony class, they are not eligible to show in any other class that is not designated as a draft class. The draft project will be eligible for all draft classes and therefore may be part of a team. The team will be entered under the one project horse or pony only. The draft that completes the team is only used in the team and is not considered an individual project.
- 19. Exhibitors may not show the same horse in Ranch and Western Showmanship, Ranch and Western Horsemanship, Ranch and Western Pleasure or Ranch Riding and Western Pleasure. That horse doesn't necessarily need to show only all Ranch or all Western. For example, an exhibitor can show their horse in Western Showmanship and then show that same horse in Ranch Horsemanship.
- Members will show in classes by age and number of years in 4-H/FFA horse projects.
- Members must enter a minimum of 2 classes per project with no limit on the number they wish to enter.
- 22. Each equine project must have a minimum body condition score of 4 and not over 7 to exhibit at the Wood County Fair. Saturday around 8 p.m. before the fair begins all exhibitors must be at their horse stalls for a mandatory horse body condition check. Horse may be excused from fair if not meeting the BCS requirements.
- 23. An obviously sick equine, or with a Grade 3 or greater lameness (consistently observable at the trot; marked nodding, hitching, or shortened stride; and minimal weight bearing in motion or at rest) will not be allowed at 4-H horse shows.
- 24. It is mandatory that all ponies (and miniature horses to be shown in pony classes) are to be measured. Ponies 5 years and older will receive a permanent Wood County Pony Measurement Card and ponies under the age of 5 years will receive a temporary card (must be measured every year until age 5). As long as the exhibitor has the permanent card, the pony does not need to be re-measured. If the card is lost, the pony must be measured again. All ponies must be measured to receive the measurement card or will not be eligible for a championship award. The pony championship awards available are for the following classes: Pony Stakes Race, Pony Poles, Pony Keyhole Race, and Pony Barrels. A copy of the measurement card must be submitted with the exhibitors' Fair Entry Form. Animals will be measured by a committee of 4-H Advisors. Official measuring is scheduled for Qualifying show day from 8-9:30 a.m. and 12-2 p.m. If an exhibitor is absolutely unable to attend this date, it is their responsibility to make arrangements with the measurement committee to have the animal measured no later than July 10th. No late measurements will be accepted! Horses will be designated as those animals over 58 inches. Ponies will be designated as those animals 58 inches and under. Horses and ponies must be entered in the proper class according to the animal's height.
- 25. All members showing Western, or Ranch projects shall wear a white or solid color dress shirt or blouse of western style with a collar and at least a 4-inch sleeve with no colored trim or logo larger than the size of a quarter, dark blue jeans, a helmet, or western hat (Showmanship), and western boots. Ties and scarves are optional. Members showing English must dress according to the Uniform Rule book. Jackets are optional according to the judge, but shirt must have at least a 4-inch sleeve if no jacket is worn. Chaps are optional in all classes. All riding and driving classes require the exhibitor to wear an ASTM or SEI safety helmet.
- 26. Appropriate attire shall be worn for the Pee Wee classes. Pee Wee's receive participation ribbons only. Pee Wee entries will be made at the same time as other entries are due. (The Pee Wee Classes are sponsored by the Wood County Agricultural Society and not the 4-H program.)
- Each individual will be assigned a number and must have the number displayed on his/her back or both sides of the saddle to be judged or will be disqualified.
- In case of hardship, any horse changed after June 1st is not eligible for Championship Classes at the Wood County fair.
- 29. A Coggins Test will not be required for the Wood County Fair.
- 30. All horse projects must be in place by Saturday, 7 p.m. (day prior to the first

- day of the fair) unless approved by the Horse Superintendent. **Projects** will be released at 9:00 p.m., Sunday, or when approved by the Horse Superintendent.
- 31. No hay is to be stored in or around the horse barn.
- 32. Barn aisle ways should be kept neat and clean at all times.
- 33. All horses are stalled in a box stall for the fair.
- 34. Horses must have a halter on at all times while in the stall.
- 35. No tying horses to the front or side bars of the box stalls. Tying to the corners is acceptable.
- 36. Any damage to the box stalls is the responsibility of the horse owner or lessee.
- 37. All manure is to be put in the designated manure dumpsters. No Trash Allowed in manure dumpsters!
- If an exhibitor participates in a Walk-Trot class, they cannot enter other lope/ canter riding classes.
- All Championship classes of Horsemanship and Equitation will include rail work and patterns.
- 40. The horse representative for the "Buchman Showmanship Sweepstakes" contest will be selected from the Showmanship Sweepstakes Qualifier class to be held Monday of the fair at 2:00 p.m. Entries will be made at the same time as other entries are due in FairEntry. This is a chance to be the horse department representative, so the first-place qualifier is required to show in the "Buchman Showmanship Sweepstakes" contest. Exhibitors that would like to compete:
 - are at least 14 years of age as of Jan. 1.
 - must have participated in the skillathon.
 - has completed interview judging.
 - has never won the "Buchman Showmanship Sweepstakes" contest in the past. may show in English or Western.
- 41. Any equine animal may be subject to drug testing.
- 42. All tack and equipment are subject to inspection prior to showing.
- 43. Horseless Horse/EWD classes are for members that have not previously shown in a walk-trot-canter class at the Wood County Fair and/or are not currently taking their own equine project. (The Horseless Horse and EWD classes are sponsored by the Wood County Agricultural Society and not the 4-H program.)
- 44. Cross Rails is a walk-trot only class. Riders are not eligible for any other jumping class. Cross Rails is open only to 1st and 2nd year jumpers AND is based on the experience of the rider NOT the horse. Anyone receiving 1st place in this class will be ineligible for this class the following year.
- 45. The Champion Reining horse will be determined by the score they receive in one run.
- 46. Versatility rules:
 - The Championship Versatility Class is open to those who, with the animal they will use in Versatility:
 - 1. successfully showed in at least two (2) Championship classes,
 - 2. placed in the top five (5) of a championship class,
 - 3. participated in the Interview Judging, and
 - 4. participated in the county or state Skillathon.
 - b. Novice Contesting is not a class eligible for Versatility. Versatility is to be entered by experienced riders. If they are experienced enough to use contesting as an eligibility point, they should enter their appropriate class of Senior, Junior, or Pony.
 - Intermediate Western Reining is a Championship class and falls under rule 41 above as a qualifying class.
 - d. Specialty classes do not apply for Versatility.
 - e. The unnecessary roughness rule in the Uniform Rules for 4-H shall apply.
 - f. Horses and ponies are eligible for versatility.
 - g. Versatility classes will consist of English Equitation, Western Horsemanship, Reining, Poles, and Barrels. Pole and Barrel classes will be based on time only.
 - h. Participation in all Versatility classes is required, or all scores will be dropped. All points will be tallied. In the event there is a tie in the placings, the higher placing will be determined by the most first place finishes. If a tie still exists, the most second place finishes will be considered, etc.
 - Bonus points will be added for exhibitors that have placed in all five classes.
 - j. You will be allowed ten (10) minutes for changing tack/attire between classes. After the Horsemanship Class, you are to stay in the designated area at the north end of the arena.
 - k. All tack and attire changes will take place in the arena or designated area. Each exhibitor is allowed 2 helpers and a wheelbarrow in the arena to help during a change. Exhibitors can use the restroom when needed and

- to get off horse while not showing. The exhibitors' helpers may be in the designated area during the competition.
- No vehicles are allowed around the outside of the arena for Versatility tack/ attire changes. This rule will be strictly enforced.
- 47. Contesting Rules:
 - a. Contesting classes will have only one run.
 - You may enter classes in only one division for contesting: Senior, Junior, Novice, or Pony.
 - c. Times, placing, and disqualifications will be done from that one run.
 - d. Hardship animals are not eligible for placing.
 - Novice Contesting is open only to 1st and 2nd year contesters AND based on the experience of the rider NOT the horse. Anyone receiving Novice Champion or Novice Reserve Champion will be ineligible for Novice classes the following year.
 - f. The Champion Contest horse will be determined by time in their one run.
 - g. Separate championships will be awarded for Senior, Junior, Novice, and Pony classes in Barrels, Poles, Stakes Race, and Keyhole Race.
 - Contest Classes are to be judged according to the publication no. 179 Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows when possible but following Jr. Fair quidelines.
 - The announcer will be the signal to start a pattern. The competitor will then have two (2) minutes to get into the ring.
 - j. The arena is to be dragged every 8-10 runs depending on the entries in a class and a list of running order is to be posted ahead of time.
- 48. Champion Horse Project will have both a Junior (9-13) and Senior (14-18) division for horses. To be eligible the exhibitor must participate in the interview and skillathon. (Refer to Fair Book for complete Champion Project Rules). Champion class points will be awarded one rider/horse. Champion Horse Project Scoring:
 - A. 50 points Interview
 - B. 10 points Premier Livestock Interview
 - C. 100 points Skillathon, (raw scores will be used)
 - D. The following points in max 2 Championship classes with the same horse.

- E. Draft horse participants will get points from highest place in any 2 draft classes.
- F. Small equine participants will get points from highest place in any 2 small equine classes.
- G. Skillathon score will be tie-breaker
- All exhibitors must complete the EquiSTEP program provided by The Ohio State University Extension by June 1 to be eligible to show at the Wood County Fair.
- 50. All exhibitors must have an Interview grade recorded with the Extension Office prior to the beginning of the fair or they will not be eligible to participate at the Wood County fair.



EQUINE SAFETY RULES

The term "Equine" includes Horses, Ponies, Donkeys and Mules

HUMANE TREATMENT OF EQUINE WILL BE EXPECTED AT ALL TIMES!

- The owner of the horse that is stalled in each box stall is responsible for any damage that occurs to the stall, the equine, or persons in the stall.
- 2. Do not go into some else's stall unless invited.
- 3. Equine must have halters on at all times in the stalls.
- DO NOT tie equine to the stall front or side bars. Tie them to a corner where the bars are bigger and sturdier.
- Clean out stalls when done using them, including the walls!
- BE Careful opening the stall door. Make sure the equine gets back before you enter.
- Stall cleaning: either tie your equine, have someone hold them or take a muck bucket in with you and close the door.
- Be courteous of everyone around you. Safety First!!
- No sitting, lying or riding on equine in the barns for any reason.
- 10. No clipping or grooming of equine in the barn aisles.
- 11. Put manure in the manure dumpster.
- 12. The manure dumpster is only for manure, NO TRASH!
- 13. When mounted, equine must have a bridle on with the rider having the reins in hand. No riding in just a halter and lead rope.
- 14. Walk or slow trot only outside or to and from arenas.
- Riding bareback only one person with a bridle, reins in hand at a walk or slow trot only. Exception is riding in a bareback class.
- 16. Riding double only with saddle and bridle at a walk or slow trot only.
- 17. No riding of equine on racetrack at any time except for Junior Fair Parade.
- 18. No equine allowed past the road in front of horse barns or past the road by the FOP building for any reason.
- 19. No equine in the campsites at any time for any reason.
- 20. No equine allowed in the bleacher areas by the arenas or tied to any fences.
- 21. No equine may be tied with the bridle reins or with the chain over the nose or under the chin or through the mouth at any place or time. This includes at the food booth.
- 22. Equine must be tied or in hand at all times when not stalled. No turn out in arenas
- 23. All 4-H youth age 19 and younger participating in riding, driving or sitting on a equine while at a 4-H function is required to wear a properly fitted headgear which meets or exceeds current ASTM/SEI standards with the chin harness securely fastened at all times.

Failure to follow these rules may result in immediate expulsion from the fairgrounds.

RULES:

- Teams will be made up of three (3) members from a club. Teams may use a member from another club if needed to fill a team.
- The contest will consist of a Junior (8-13) and Senior (14-18) division. A junior member can be on a senior team, but a senior can not be on a junior team.
- Each club may enter two teams. The two teams can be both Junior or both Senior or one of each.
- All team members must wear boots or heavy leather shoes and long pants. No gloves or coveralls may be worn. No team (or county) identification may be exhibited by clothing or tack. Outfits should match, English or Western, hats are optional. Safety Helmets are acceptable throughout the competition.
- Back numbers that are large enough to be seen from a distance must be worn at all times during the competition.
- Each team will provide its own grooming tools (see grooming kit). No electric
 or battery powered equipment may be used.
- Each horse/pony must arrive wearing a properly fitting nylon or leather halter (no silver show halters) and a tie rope. The horse/pony should be reasonably groomed. No show sheen is to be used before mud is applied.
- The horses/ponies should arrive at the contest site at least one hour prior to the contest starting time so that the management can uniformly dirty them.
- · The horses/ponies will be dirtied using mud.
- A team member may work on a horse/pony provided by his/her team for the contest if it is acceptable with the judges.
- Each team will provide a handler. Handlers will have control of the horse/ pony at all times and line the teams up in numerical order. They will maintain a safe distance between horse/pony and move horse/pony (after telling team members) only as needed for safety.
- Handlers will not coach the team members in any way. They will speak to team members only when necessary to maintain safety.
- No gum allowed.
- Any coaching from the handler or spectators will result in the disqualification of the team.

REQUIRED GROOMING KIT

Equipment does not have to be new but should be clean, dry, and in good condition.

- 1. Curry Comb (hard rubber or plastic)
- 2. Stiff Bristle Brush
- 3. Body Brush (medium stiff bristles)
- 4. Dandy Brush or Soft Bristle Brush
- 5. Mane and Tail Comb or Regular Hairbrush (not both)
- 6. Hoof Pick (standard type)
- 7. Grooming Cloth (no larger than a hand towel)
- 8. Quart of water (can be bottle or spray bottle or bucket) (no glass)
- 9. Ground cloth (bath or beach towel or use your good judgment on size)
- 10. Fly spray can be used if needed. (no show sheen or horse finish)
- 11. Chain Lead a chain lead must be displayed on the ground cloth which will be used during the showmanship part of the class. Another chain lead may be used to hold the horse during the grooming.
- ** This kit should be tripled for numbers 1-7 to give each team member his/her own set of equipment to use. However, when these items are tripled, they need to be identical in type and appearance. The team should have one each of items 8-11.

SCHEDULE OF EVENTS:

- 3 ½ hours before the scheduled start, the "Dirt Demons" will uniformly dirty the horses/ponies
- The contestants will take a written test at the beginning of the contest.
- Total time for written test is 15 minutes.

- The teams are to place their grooming equipment 10 feet behind the horse/ pony they are to groom and then stand behind the tools.
- Judge will inspect the horses/ponies and equipment.
- Timed portion of grooming begins. Grooming time is 30 minutes.
- After timed grooming is complete, the judge evaluates the groomed horses/ ponies.
- Teams are then given 10 minutes to work with their groomed horse/pony to prepare for showmanship. There is no time limit for this section.

CONTEST SCORING: EQUIPMENT: (5 points)

- 1. Placed well behind horse/pony on the ground cloth.
- 2. Three complete sets are desirable, only one bottle of water, fly spray and chain lead
- 3. Tools need not be new, but should not be ratty, dirty, or wet.
- Tools should be placed on ground cloth with bristles facing up. If hats are worn, they should be removed before grooming and placed with tools.

TEAMWORK AND METHODS: (35 points)

- 1. Teams should work smoothly together.
- Members should not stop grooming until time is called unless there is a question of safety.
- 3. Do not rush at horse/pony.
- 4. Groom from front to back and top to bottom.
- Use tools in proper order curry first, then stiff bristle brush, then body/medium bristle brush, then dandy/soft bristle brush and rag.
- 6. Do not tear at mane and tail.
- 7. Use one tool at a time free hand can steady the horse/pony.
- Curry do not use on head or below the knees and hocks or on tender parts or on mane and tail.
- 9. Body brush do not use on head.
- 10. Stiff bristle brush do not use on head. May use on lower legs, mane and tail.
- 11. Dandy brush may use on entire horse/pony except hooves.
- 12. Hoof pick may use edge to scrape mud from outside of hooves. Carefully. Pick feet in order, starting with near front, then near rear, off rear, and off front.
- 13. Water use on cloth. Do not spray or apply directly on the horse/pony.
- 14. Fly spray use with care. If it is absolutely necessary to use while grooming, all grooming should stop. Try to wait to spray until the ten-minute practice time.
- 15. Cloth may use on entire horse/pony. Do not shake near horse/pony.
- 16. No trimming allowed Hair will not be clipped or cut.
- 17. Halter cleaning will be part of the finished animal condition score.
- 18. Notify judges when picking hooves.

SAFETY: (40 points)

- 1. 4-H rules of safety handling should be observed.
- 2. Do not kneel or squat.
- 3. Do not crawl under horse/pony.
- 4. Do not reach across to other side.
- 5. Do not go under neck.
- 6. Do not put head or face where it can be kicked.
- Do not put tools on ground, under or on horse/pony. If tool can't fit in pocket, it should be returned to ground cloth.
- If tool is dropped, use foot to move it to a safe distance from the horse/pony before picking it up.
- 9. Someone should stay near the head.
- 10. If horse/pony is upset, calm it before continuing.
- 11. If it becomes obvious that a certain procedure cannot be safely completed, such as handling rear legs, notify the judges.
- 12. Never get into a position that you can't get out of immediately.
- 13. Don't all bunch up at one end or one side of the horse/pony.
- 14. When feet are being cleaned, all should be aware. Unless there is a problem, it is not necessary to stop grooming.

WRITTEN TEST (30 points, 10 points per team member)

- All three members of each team will take a written test covering information from the appropriate 4-H books.
- Junior resources: Basic Horse Management (174) and Horse Safety (191R)
- Senior resources: Same as Junior and Light Horse Selection (175) and Uniform Rules 4H Horse Shows (179)

FINISHED ANIMAL CONDITION (10 points)

SHOWMANSHIP (15 points, 5 points per team member)

- Showmanship will follow 4-H rules. No attire change will be allowed. You must start and finish the competition in the same outfit. Hats may still be optional during showmanship. However, must not be work during the grooming portion.
- The only equipment changes allowed for the showing will be a chain lead strap to replace the tie rope used while grooming. No halter changes.
- All three members will be judged on their ability to show the horse/pony. Each member will show the horse/pony as instructed by the judge. The team members will decide which one will do each part of the pattern.
- The showmanship pattern will be determined by the judge and posted one hour prior to the contest.

Total Points Possible for Contest = 135

The team with the highest score wins. The top three teams will be placed in each division

- The Royalty Court will consist of Junior Fair participants selected from nominations made by the various youth organizations and are limited to one King and one Queen candidate per organization.
- 2. Those nominated must be actively enrolled in the Wood County youth organization they represent (not an honorary or "special" member), be in good standing in their organization and of good moral character. Youth organizations may consist of 4-H Clubs, FFA and FCCLA Chapters, 4-H Leadership Board, Scouts of America and Girl Scout Troops, Farm Bureau, and Livestock Judging Team. Nominees must be 16 years old as of January 1, of current year, not married, not have been married, not expecting a child, not have borne a child, or not have fathered a child. The nominee must never have been convicted or charged with a criminal offense and no criminal charges presently pending against the contestant and must be able to comply with all other rules laid out in the Wood County Fair Royalty Application Packet. The contestant must also be eligible to enter an exhibit in the Jr. Fair, although no actual exhibit is required.
- 3. Each youth organization should secure the proper nomination forms available at the Wood County Fair Office or through the fair's website.
- All nomination forms must be received by the Wood County Agricultural Society by <u>Noon, Friday, April 25th</u> with the required sponsorship fee. Sponsorship fee is nonrefundable.
- All former Kings and Queens are ineligible to compete, although all former attendants are eligible to compete if they meet all other requirements.
- The King and Queen will reign until the crowning ceremony the following year.
- 7. Youth organizations sponsoring a candidate(s) must provide appropriate parade transportation for their entrant(s) (auto, pick-up truck or buggy acceptable). No political signs or commercial advertising. No hats of any kind are allowed to be worn in the parade.
- 8. The Wood County King, Queen and Parade Committees by a majority vote (meeting together at a special meeting) have the right to revoke the crown, title and accompanying honors of the Fair King, Queen or Court Member at any time during the year for any action deemed improper for a Wood County Fair King, Queen, or Royalty Court Member including getting married, expecting a child, have borne a child or fathered a child. If this action is taken by a majority vote, the respective title, crown and honors

- will fall to the next runner up.
- In case of rain or inclement weather the contest will be held in a location to be announced or may be rescheduled.
- 10. All Contestants must be present at the beginning of the parade to be eligible for the Royal Court. Anyone that does not follow any rules will be automatically disqualified.
- All deadlines will be enforced or candidate will be disqualified. (No Nomination Form/No Resume and Application Packet = No Interview or Parade Participation))
- 12. There are 2 main divisions of judging they include;
 - a.) Resume
 - *The Resume must be turned in on time to complete the interview process. Resume is due <u>Friday</u>, <u>May 23rd by Noon</u> to the Wood County Agricultural Society, P.O. Box 146, 13800 W. Poe Rd., Bowling Green. Ohio.

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JUNIOR FAIR CONSTITUTION

Revised 1959,1974,1975,1982,1984,1986, 2002, 2004, 2005, 2013, 2016, 2020

Article 1- Name

The organization shall be known as the Wood County Junior Fair Board.

Article 2- Purpose

The purpose of this group shall be to promote the interests of the Wood County youth through their exhibits and activities at the Wood County Fair. Whenever possible, activities of Junior exhibitors shall be coordinated for the benefit of the total group. At all times the Wood County Junior Fair Board shall cooperate with the Wood County Junior Fair Board Advisory Committee and the Wood County Agricultural Society and their Board of Directors, also known as the Wood County Senior Fair Board, to govern Wood County Junior Fair activities.

Article 3- Membership

- Membership of the Wood County Junior Board shall consist of 4-H Clubs, FFA, FCCLA, Boy and Girl Scout Troops, Farm Bureau and or any other youth organization accepted by the Wood County Senior Fair Board.
- All members must be at least a sophomore in high school. Members cannot be older than eighteen years old as of January 1st of the current year. Members must be actively enrolled in their respective organization for at least one year.
- 3. Membership is limited to fourth year members with one year of Junior Fair eligibility remaining after serving their third term. The Junior Fair Board Executive Committee will select these members at the August meeting and members must accept the role of fourth term prior to the October meeting.
- Junior Fair Board attendance at meetings and activities is mandatory. Those not following the guidelines can be dismissed the following year and will be unable to complete their term.
 - Meeting Attendance: of the 10 scheduled meetings, members must attend seven. Absence may be excused with approval.
 - Pre-Fair and Fair Activities: Board members are required to participate in all activities assigned.
 - The Executive Committee will evaluate each Wood County Junior Fair Board member following the fair.
 - Meeting Schedule: Meetings will be scheduled in advance, October through August.

Article 4- Wood County Junior Fair Board

The Wood County Junior Fair Board shall consist of:

- 1. The Wood County Junior Fair Board Advisory Committee.
- 2. Sixteen members representing 4-H Clubs (eight appointed each year).
- 3. Eight At-Large Horse members (three appointed each year).
- 4. Two representatives from FCCLA (one appointed each year).
- Two representatives from The Boy Scouts of America (one appointed each year).
- Two representatives from The Girl Scouts of America (one appointed each year).
- Two representatives from the Farm Bureau Youth Group (one appointed each year).
- 8. Two representatives from each interested FFA chapter (one appointed each
- 9. Any number of "Third Term" members. These are members who have completed their second term as a member on the Wood County Junior Fair Board and are appointed for a third term. These members must still be eligible to participate in the Wood County Junior Fair.
- 10. Any other youth organization indicating an interest in the Wood County Junior Fair can elect a representative with approval of the Wood County Junior Fair Board and the Wood County Senior Fair Board.
- 11. Any open position can be filled as an "At-Large" position if approved by the Wood County Junior Fair Board.

Article 5- Executive Committee

The Wood County Junior Fair Board Executive Committee shall consist of six officers elected from the membership of the Wood County Junior Fair Board. The President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, News Reporter and one representative to the Wood County Senior Fair Board, shall be elected by the Wood County Junior Fair Board membership to form the Executive Committee. These officers shall be elected by nomination and secret ballot involving all Wood County Junior Fair Board members present at the first regular scheduled meeting for the new board term. Additional Representatives to the Executive Board will include Superintendents of each livestock department; the superintendent will be appointed by the officers of the Executive Committee. Only second, third, fourth term Wood County Junior Fair Board members, of good standing, are eligible to hold office.

Article 6- Duties of the President

The President shall preside at the sessions of the Wood County Junior Fair Board and see that the rules of the organization are enforced.

Article 7- Duties of the Vice-President

The Vice-President shall assume the duties of the President in his or her absence.

Article 8- Duties of the Secretary

The Secretary shall keep a record of all proceedings and business for the organization. This includes the recording of minutes from regularly scheduled meetings and the handling of all correspondence.

Article 10- Duties of the Treasurer

The Treasurer shall keep a record of funds and invoices of all financial activities pertaining to the Wood County Junior Fair Board.

Article 11- Duties of the Reporter

The Reporter shall keep the news media informed of all Wood County Junior Fair activities.

Article 12- Duties of the Representatives to the Wood County Senior Fair Board

Four Wood County Junior Fair Board members shall serve as ex-officio members of the Wood County Senior Fair Board. They shall represent the Wood County Junior Fair Board at all Wood County Senior Fair Board meetings.

Article 13- Duties of Members of the Wood County Junior Fair Board

Each member of the Wood County Junior Fair Board shall attend regularly scheduled meetings. A schedule of meetings shall be set-up by the Executive Committee. Each member shall serve as Department Superintendent or Assistant Department Superintendent, should they be appointed. The superintendent and assistant shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, as they deem appropriate, for the following committees, (an ad-hoc committee of Wood County Junior Fair Board members shall also be formed by the Executive Committee for each for the following):

- 1. Beef Superintendent and or Assistant.
- 2. Catch-A-Pig Superintendent and or Assistant.
- 3. Cleanest Exhibit Superintendent and or Assistant.
- 4. Dairy Superintendent and or Assistant.
- 5. FFA Projects Superintendent and or Assistant.
- Goat Superintendent and or Assistant.
- 7. Horse Superintendent and or Assistant.
- 8. Livestock Exhibition Barn Superintendent and or Assistant.
- 9. Livestock Skillathon Superintendent and or Assistant.
- 10. Press Corp Superintendent and or Assistant.
- 11. Rabbits and Poultry Superintendent and or Assistant.
- 12. Sheep Superintendent and or Assistant.
- 13. Swine Superintendent and or Assistant.
- Showmanship Sweepstakes and Champion Barn Superintendent and or Assistant.
- 15. Trophies Superintendent and or Assistant.
- 16. Youth Day Superintendent and or Assistant.
- 17. Other Departments and Committees as deemed necessary.

The Superintendents of the Beef, Dairy, Goat, Horse, Rabbits and Poultry, Sheep, and Swine committees shall also serve on:

- 1. Livestock Sale Committee
- 2. Rules Committee

Article 15- Advisory Committee

The Wood County Junior Fair Board Advisory Committee shall consist of:

- 1. At least two Directors of the Wood County Fair.
- 2. The Wood County 4-H Extension Agent and other Wood County 4-H Extension staff as necessary.
- An advisor from any interested organization represented on the Wood County Junior Fair Board.
- 4. Others appointed by the Wood County Junior Fair Board.

Article 16- Selection of Junior Fair Board Members

- 1. The 4-H representatives shall be selected by the Wood County 4-H Committee.
- 2. Each interested FFA chapter shall select its representative.
- 3. The FCCLA shall select its representative.
- The Boy Scouts of America representative shall be selected by the Office of the Field Representative.
- The Girl Scouts of America representative shall be selected by the Office of the Field Representative.
- 6. The Youth representative of the Farm Bureau shall be selected by the Farm
- 7. All members shall serve a two-year term providing the member has met their

- obligations to the Wood County Fair Board. No member shall serve two full terms consecutively.
- The Executive Committee members shall evaluate all members each year to determine further involvement.
- For any vacancy that occurs the Wood County Junior Fair Board Executive Committee shall have the power to appoint an eligible replacement.

Article 17- Amendments

This constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of Wood County Junior Fair Board members present at a regular or special meeting of the Wood County Junior Fair Board, providing due notice of the proposed alteration or amendment was provided in writing to all Wood County Junior Fair Board members at least one week prior to the meeting in which the amendment will be proposed. Junior Fair Responsibility and Authority:

- The Wood County Fair is an event put on by the Wood County Agricultural Society and their Board of Directors to promote progress in community-wide interests of agriculture, education, arts and sciences, and to improve the standard of living throughout the county.
- 2. The Junior Fair is a consortium of youth organizations run cooperatively under the sanction of the Wood County Agricultural Society for the purpose of showcasing educational programs throughout the county. The Wood County Junior Fair Board utilizes the authority vested in it by the Wood County Senior Fair Board and other cooperating youth organizations to regulate Wood County Junior Fair events, activities and competitions. In so doing, the Wood County Junior Fair Board sets parameters for overall inclusion in Wood County Fair activities without restricting the ability of participating youth organizations to formulate their own policies and regulations for membership.
- 3. The 4-H program is a major component of the youth development program of the Ohio State University Extension, an educational outreach organization aimed at meeting the needs of county citizenry. All regulations and policies pertaining to the 4-H program come under the jurisdiction of the County 4-H Extension Agent, and others governing the 4-H program.
- 4. The FFA and FCCLA are educational programs run through the public schools resourced by the Ohio Department of Vocational Education. All regulations and policies pertaining to the FFA and FCCLA come under the jurisdiction of FFA and FCCLA advisors and others governing the FFA and FCCLA program, respectively.
- Other youth organizations, such as Boy Scouts of America, Girl Scouts of America, Farm Bureau, etc. are recognized as self-sufficient entities and are responsible for their own policies and regulations
- 6. All Wood County Junior Fair regulations and policies listed in the Wood County Fair Handbook and minutes are derived from this cooperative authority of the Wood County Senor Fair Board and involved youth organizations. Enforcement of such may be handled by any Wood County Junior Fair official including but not limited to, Wood County Junior Fair Board advisors and Wood County Senior Fair Board members.
- 7. Wood County Junior Fair regulations and policies will be enforced, removed, suspended or added upon by the action of the Wood County Junior Fair Board Executive Committee in consultation with the Wood County Junior Fair Board advisors and the Wood County Senior Fair Board, for the best interests of the Wood County Junior Fair.
- The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the Wood County Junior Fair Board in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not superseded with these bylaws and special rules of the Wood County Junior Fair Board.

WOOD COUNTY JUNIOR FAIR BOARD BYLAWS

Article I: The name of the organization shall be Wood County Junior Fair Board, organized in Wood County, OH.

Article II: Meetings

Section 1: Meetings of the board are to be held each month; the time and place are to be determined by the board and coordinator at least one week prior to the meeting.

Section 2: Members are to have a one-week reminder before upcoming meetings via email.

Section 3: Use of Parliamentary Procedure shall govern the meetings.

Section 4: Quorum (majority of members) must be present to vote on important matters.

Article III: Policies

Section 1: To maintain membership, each member must sign and adhere to the badge contract. A new contract must be signed each year of membership. The

executive board and junior fair coordinator holds the right to terminate membership of anyone not honoring that contract.

Section 2: If a member is absent because of an emergency or school conflict they must contact an executive board member or coordinator in order to be excused.

Section 3: The purpose of the junior fair board shall be to promote the interests of the Wood County youth through their exhibits and activities at the Wood County Fair

Article IV: Officers

Section 1: The constitutional offices shall be composed of President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Reporter, and two Senior Fair Board Representatives. Terms of each office is one year.

Section 2: Elections are to be held the first meeting after new members have been selected. Elections are to be done by an accepted nomination. Voting shall be done by means of secret ballots. The ballots are to be counted and announced by an unbiased nonmember present at the meeting. The office is determined by the nominee with the majority of votes.

Section 3: The office of president must be at least a third-year board member and can only hold the office for no more than one term. All other offices may not be filled by a first-year member.

Section 4: Duties of each office:

President- presides over full board meetings and ensures that rules are fairly enforced. Robert's Rules of Order shall be used to run the meetings efficiently. Vice President- assumes the duties of President in his/her absence and coordinates the work of committees.

Secretary- prepares an agenda for meetings, keeps an account of attendance, records the minutes of every full board meeting, handles correspondence, and issues notices and announcements to the board.

Treasurer- maintains current and accurate accounts of receipts and disbursements, responsible for issuing checks to pay for approved bills, and reports the financial record at every full board meeting.

Reporter- keeps all media up to date with accurate upcoming information and presides as the superintendent of the press corps committee.

Senior Fair Board Representatives- attends all Senior Fair Board meetings and corresponds any information between the two boards.

Article V: Departments and Committees

Section 1: Departments shall consist of: Beef, Swine, Dairy, Goats, Rabbits, Poultry, Sheep, and Horses.

Section 2: Standing Committees shall consist of: Showmanship Sweepstakes, Catch-a-Pig, Press Corp, Trophies and Awards, FFA Projects, Skillathon, Junior Fair Office, Champion Barn, Fundraising, and Rules.

Section 3: Additional departments and committees may be formed when necessary.

Section 4: Members of the departments and committees will be assigned by the executive board. Members will request department and committee assignments at the first meeting after new members have been selected.

Section 5: Members of each department/committee are responsible to attend all department/committee activities.

Section 6: Superintendents are responsible for communication to their committee or department and to record attendance at department/committee activities.

Article VI: Membership

Section 1: Membership is comprised of member in good stand of Wood County 4-H, FFA, FCCLA, Boy and Girl Scout Troops, Farm Bureau, or any other youth organization accepted by the Senior Fair Board.

Section 2: To be a member of the board, candidates must be at least a sophomore and go through a selection process of the organizations in which they represent.

Section 3: 4th year membership is applicable to members who are still active in the organization in which they were chosen and are invited by the executive board.

Article VII: Meeting Agenda - Roll Call, Reading and approval or adoption of minutes, Financial Report, Reports of Committees, Old Business, New Business, and Adjournment

Article VIII: Amendments - The by-laws may be amended at any regular or special meeting of the board by two thirds vote of those present provided the amendment was brought forth at least one week prior to which the amendment will be proposed.

WOOD COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

(Adopted on October 25, 1956 by the Wood County Agricultural Society) (Revision adopted December 21, 2023)

Article I - Name

This organization shall be known as the Wood County Agricultural Society.

Article II — Object

The objectives of this Society shall be to: foster and advertise progress and achievements in agriculture, education, industry, the arts and sciences, and in the improvement of home and community living; encourage the expression of cooperative endeavor and accomplishment, the community spirit of people of all ages and interests working together; promote fairs, expositions, competitions, exhibits and other activities which will provide for the participation and benefit of people of all interests and especially for the youth of the county; provide adequate facilities and leadership to carry out all of the above to fullest possible degree.

Article III — Membership

SECTION 1. "Members of this Society shall be residents of Wood County, Ohio, who are 18 years old or older and who have paid the annual membership fee fixed by the Board of Directors, as directed by the constitution, by-laws or rules adopted by the Board of Directors or of the Ohio Department of Agriculture."

SEC. 2. A printed certificate of membership shall be issued to each member who pays the required fee, and said certificate shall be issued. Duplicate stubs of same shall be properly filled out and preserved. All certificates shall be numbered consecutively. No person shall pay or secure more than one membership, and that for himself or herself. A list of the members shall be kept in the office of the secretary of the society and open to public inspection at all times so as to afford convenient information to any resident of the county.

SEC. 3. Society memberships shall be placed on sale at least two weeks before old memberships expire on January 1 of each year and shall remain on sale at least thirty hours a week at a place specified by the society until at 7 days prior to the election of directors of the Society. Notice of the days, hours and locations of the sales shall be announced in the annual premium list of the society, at the start of the sale, and at least three times between January 1 of each year and the termination of the sale, the last of which shall be not more than two weeks before sale ends, in at least one newspaper of general circulation in the county and or on the fair's website and through social media. Membership certificates shall bear dates (day and year) membership begins and ends, denoting period of membership in the society, the name of the society, and a place for the signature of the person holding membership.

SEC. 4. No membership certificate shall be issued to corporations, organizations, partnership or firms. All membership certificates shall be issued in the name of an individual who has paid the required membership fee and only that person whose name appears upon the membership certificate shall be considered member of the Agricultural Society and shall have a right to vote at the annual election of directors of the society, or hold office.

Article IV — Annual Meeting of the Membership

SECTION 1. An annual meeting of the membership of the Society shall be held in December at a time and place determined by the Board of Directors, which shall be announced in one or more newspapers of general circulation in the county and or on the fair's website and through social media at least once not less than two weeks before and not more than four weeks prior to the date set for the meeting.

SEC. 2. At each annual meeting of the membership the officers and directors of the Society shall make reports concerning the past fair and other activities conducted in the name of the Society during the year and they shall make recommendations for the improvement of future fairs and other activities to better carry out the objectives of the Society. During the meeting opportunity shall be given to the members to make suggestions for the improvement of the Society, the fair and other activities. Other items of business may be presented and considered as may be prescribed by this constitution or is deemed proper by the President and-or the directors.

Article V — Board of Directors

SECTION 1. The affairs of the Society shall be directed by a board of Directors. The county shall be divided into three districts. District 1 shall be comprised of Middleton, Plain, Washington, Grand Rapids and Weston townships. District 2 shall be comprised of Perrysburg, Lake, Webster, Troy, Freedom and Center Townships. District 3 shall be comprised of Milton, Liberty, Portage, Montgomery, Jackson, Henry, Bloom and Perry townships and the City of Bowling Green. Eight directors shall be elected from District

1; said directors shall reside within the District limits. Eight directors shall be elected from District 2; said directors shall reside within the District limit. Nine directors shall be elected from District 3; said directors shall reside within the District limits. All shall be elected from and by the membership of the Society at an annual election of the society for terms of three (3) years so arranged that the terms of one third of the directors shall expire each year.

The highest votes fill the positions of the elections. There will be a separate ballot for someone running for a term other than three (3) years position for that district.

- SEC. 2. The terms of directors shall begin and expire at the annual reorganization meeting of the board during the month of August but not before they or their successors have qualified for office.
- SEC. 3. Any vacancy caused by the refusal to qualify for office, resignation, removal from the county, death, removal from office or other cause may be filled by the board until the next annual election, when a director shall be elected by the membership to fill the unexpired term if such exists.
- SEC. 4. Any director or officer can be removed with or without just cause. Reasons a director/officer can be removed from the board includes but is not limited to:
- (A). failing to attend three consecutive meetings of the board, without being excused by the President,
- (B). failing to perform the duties expected of him or her in reasonable time or proper fashion,
- (C) if at any time the director ceases to hold the required qualifications of being a director as set forth in the bylaws,
- (D) failing to disclose a conflict of interest that result in a personal or professional profit,
- (E) or is found to have engaged in conduct unbecoming of an officer or board member

Officers or Directors will only be removed after due process proceedings have been completed as stated in the Roberts Rule of Order Newly Revised 12th Edition Disciplinary Procedures S61-S63.

SEC. 5. The County Agricultural Agent shall be a member of the board but shall not have voting power. County officials and other members of the Society may be designated by the board as honorary directors to serve without voting power in advisory or consulting capacities on the board.

SEC. 6. Any director leaving the board under good terms that has served as a director for 10 or more years will receive lifetime membership to the Society.

SEC. 7. The fair board member has no authority except when sitting as a member of the board. Board members should always seek information pertaining to the welfare of the fair, but he/she should refrain from discussing confidential matters with anyone not in responsible position. It will be impossible for the member to represent the public adequately if he/she does not undertake to discover public opinion on matters to be discussed at board meetings. However, he/she will be equally in error if he compromises the board of fair officials by conversation about matters best kept as matter of board record.

Article VI — Election of Directors

SECTION 1. The annual election of the directors shall be by written or printed ballots, during a period of not less than four hours, during the last day of the fair that admission is charged, and prior to the general release of any exhibits, at a time and place fixed by the Board of Directors at a meeting held at least six weeks prior to the date set for the election. If for any reason a fair is not held, the election of directors will be held at a time and location set by the Board of Directors.

SEC. 2. The Secretary shall give notice of the place, date and hours of the director's election for three weeks prior to the holding thereof, in a newspaper of general circulation in the county, or as provided in section 7.16 of the Revised Code, by letter mailed to each member of the Society or publishing notice on the society's website.

SEC. 3. Members of the Society must declare their candidacy for the office of Director of the Society by filing with the Secretary of the Society, a petition signed by ten or more members of the Society who are residents of the county, at least seven days before the annual election is to be held. The petition submitted shall state the specific seat for which the candidate is seeking to be elected. Any member who fails to file a petition that includes the specific seat is ineligible for election as a director. Only candidates who have met all of the filing requirements will be eligible for election as a director. Blank petitions shall be furnished by the Society and shall be obtained from the Secretary.

SEC. 4. The filing requirements for the office of director and information as to how these may be fulfilled shall be announced in the annual premium list,

and in at least one newspaper of general circulation in the county and/or on the society's website. Said announcements shall be made no earlier than six weeks and no later than three weeks before the annual election of directors. SEC. 5. "Only persons 18 years or older holding membership certificates in the Society at the close of the fair shall be entitled to vote at the annual election."

SEC. 6. Members must vote in person, with a current Wood County Agricultural Society membership card and a valid state identification card and may vote for only eligible candidates whose names appear on the ballot or on such other questions which may appear on the ballot. Ballots shall be marked with an "X" before the name of the candidate voted for and before the "Yes" or "No" on questions listed on the ballot; otherwise the vote will not be counted. No proxy or absentee ballots shall be accepted or counted.

SEC. 7. Ballots shall be prepared for the election by the secretary containing the names of all candidates who have filed petitions with him/her, amendments to the constitution or bylaws which have been proposed by the board or by petition of the members filed with him/her, the name of the Society, date of election, directions for voting, etc.

SEC. 8. The President shall appoint three judges and two clerks who are members of the Society, but not candidates for election, to conduct the election of directors and the voting on questions or amendments included on the ballots and to declare the results thereof. Candidates may witness the count either personally or by proxy. Polls must be open at least four hours between the hours of 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. on the day of election and the time of opening and closing stated in the notice of elections. The judges of election shall have the membership roll and verify the rights of all persons to vote before issuing ballots. The clerks of election shall register the names of all persons voting and tally the count in poll books and tally sheets furnished by the Ohio Department of Agriculture, one copy of which shall be placed on file with the Secretary of the Society and the other copy shall be mailed by the Sec'y to the Department of Agriculture within ten days after said election. All ballots cast shall be filed with the secretary of the Society.

SEC. 9. A majority of the board of directors or any group of twenty-five citizens of legal voting age of the county may petition the Department of Agriculture to supervise the annual election of directors.

Article VII - Annual Reorganization Of The Board

SECTION 1. The Board of Directors shall meet annually during the month of August and elect a President, 1st Vice President, 2nd Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. The President, 1st Vice President and 2nd Vice President shall be Directors. The secretary and treasurer may or may not be Directors.

SEC. 2. Before election of officers, the newly elected Directors shall qualify by taking the oath or affirmation before a Notary Public, Judge or Mayor.

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the Constitution of the United States, the Constitution of Ohio, Laws of Ohio and the rules and regulations of the Department of Agriculture of Ohio pertaining to agricultural societies, and to the best of my ability perform the duties of Director of the Wood County Agricultural Society, so help me God."

SEC. 3. Any officer elected by the board, but who is not a member of the board, shall qualify for any office by taking the same oath as required of directors except that the title of the office to be held shall be substituted for the word "director" in the above oath, and the oath shall be taken before the President of the Society and in the presence of the Board of Directors.

SEC. 4. The board may elect a member of the board or some other qualified person as Fair Manager, either on a part time or full time basis. The Fair Manager's term of employment and duties will be determined by the board.

SEC. 5. The President shall appoint a nominating committee and nominations shall also be received from the floor. The election for each office of the board to be filled shall be conducted separately by secret written ballots and a majority of the votes of the directors present at said election shall be needed to elect any officer.

Article VIII — Compensation of Directors and Officers

SECTION 1. The compensation of board members and officer shall be set by the board of directors in accordance with the rules of the Ohio Department of Agriculture.

Article IX — Bonding of Officers

SECTION 1. The Treasurer and Secretary or any other officer designated by the Board shall post a surety bond payable to the Society, conditioned upon the faithful performance of the duties of his/her office, in amount and kind as fixed by the Board of Directors and Ohio Laws.

SEC. 2. The cost of such bonds shall be paid out of the funds of the Society.

SEC. 3. The bonds shall be filed with the Clerk of the County Commissioners.

Article X — Finance and Banking

SECTION 1. The Board of Directors shall, in accord with Ohio Laws, designate one or more bank depositories for the funds of the Society and all funds of the Society shall be deposited in said depository or depositories in the name of the Society.

SEC. 2. Funds of the Society shall be paid out only as a result of action by the Board of Directors, and on written orders issued by the Secretary, and drawn by the treasurer against the proper account of the society. Copy of voucher to be properly filed and retained by each.

SEC. 3. Accurate and complete records shall be kept of all receipts and expenditures, of all money due and owed by the Society, bank deposits and statements, audits and financial reports or other transactions pertaining to the finances of the Society, all of which shall be subject to inspection, audit and approval by the Bureau of Inspection and Supervision of Public Offices of Ohio, the Department of Agriculture of Ohio and the directors and members of the Society. All books, accounts, reports, etc., shall be made available for inspection on request.

SEC. 4. The Board of Directors shall prepare an itemized statement of receipts and expenditures for each year. Said statement is to be signed and sworn to by the Secretary and Treasurer and approved by a majority of the Board of Directors. The board shall publish an announcement in either newspaper of general circulation in the county or on the society's website for not less than two weeks that contain all of the following (1) A statement indicating that the annual financial report has been filed in accordance with the director of agriculture as provided in for in section 1711.06 of the Revised Code; (2) A statement indicating that any person who wishes to obtain a copy of the report may contact the treasurer of the society; (3) The treasurer of the society's contact information that a person may use to obtain a copy of the report. Before or during the annual meeting provided for in Sec. 901.06 of the Revised Code, the Society Secretary shall deliver to the Department of Agriculture all required financial documentation in the manner required by Revised Code 117.38 and 117.20 and Red Book section 901-5-07

Article XI — Annual Fair — Premiums Offered

SECTION 1. The annual fair and junior fair of the Society shall be held on the fair grounds of the Society during the last three weeks of July or the first three weeks of August; the exact dates to be fixed by the Board of Directors subject to the approval of the Ohio Department of Agriculture.

SEC. 2. The Society shall annually offer and award premiums for the improvement of grains, fruit, vegetables, livestock, articles of domestic industry, public school displays, and such other articles, productions and improvements, as it may deem proper, and the Board of Directors may perform all acts that are best calculated to promote the agricultural and household manufacturing interests of the county and of the state. The board shall regulate the amount of premiums and their different grades, so that all may have an opportunity to complete therefore.

SEC. 3. The Society shall annually publish a Premium List and other information relative to the fair or other events sponsored for the benefit of the public by June 15.

SEC. 4. Solicitation of ads shall be started November 1, finished and turned in by April 15.

Article XII — Powers of The Board

SECTION 1. At any scheduled meeting, a majority of the Board of Directors may: create any office or position deemed necessary for the conduct of the affairs of the Society, elect or approve the appointment of any qualified person, who may or may not be a member of the board, fix the compensation, if any, or provide for the expenses thereof, determine the duties and term of office, and fix the sureties to be provided for such office or position, or to fill any vacancy which may occur in any office of the Society. Offices or positions created may include: caretaker, manager or superintendent of buildings andor grounds; manager or superintendent of an activity; attorney; assistant secretary; assistant manager; assistant treasurer.

SEC. 2. At any scheduled meeting, a majority of the Board of Directors may approve any action deemed to be in the best interests of the Society and not in conflict with its constitution or bylaws, Ohio Laws or Rules of the Ohio Department of Agriculture or other legal regulations.

Article XIII — Amendments

SECTION 1. The constitution or bylaws of the Society shall not be amended except by a majority vote of the membership voting at the annual meeting of the membership of the Society or at the annual election of the board of directors.

SEC. 2. Amendments of the constitution or bylaws may be proposed by:

(A) A majority of the board of directors at a scheduled meeting voting in favor

of placing an amendment on the ballot: or

(B) Filing a petition with the secretary of the society at least fourteen days prior to the annual meeting of the membership of the society or at least fourteen days before the annual election of directors. Said petition shall set forth the proposed amendment or amendments and be signed by not less than 25 members of the Society.

SEC. 3. If an amendment is proposed as set forth in (A) or (B) above, it shall be submitted to the membership of the Society at the annual election of directors or the annual meeting.

SEC. 4. Any amendment proposed as set forth above shall be published in at least one newspaper of general circulation of the county, and/or on the fair's website, through social media and any other way deemed necessary by the Redbook, no less than three but not more than ten days before it is to be voted on. SEC. 5. When more than one amendment shall be submitted at one time, they shall be so submitted as to enable the members to vote on each amendment, separately.

BY-LAWS

Article I — Quorum

SECTION 1 A majority of the members of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business of the Society.

Article II — Meetings

SECTION 1. Regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held each month; the time and place of meetings to be determined by the Board (and publicly announced).

SEC. 2. Special meetings of the Board may be held, at the call of the President or at the call of the Secretary upon the written request to the Secretary by not less than three members of the Board of Directors.

SEC. 3. Written notice of special meetings of the Board of Directors shall be delivered personally to each director through electronic communications or mail at least two days before the meeting. Such notice, however, may be waived by any director either before or after the meeting. The notice must specify the purpose of the meeting.

Sec. 4 Electronic Meetings - The annual meeting, regular meeting of the board of directors, committees, and special meetings are authorized to meet by telephone, or web conference or through other electronic communication media as long as all the members may simultaneously hear each other and participate during the meeting.

Sec. 5 Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised will be used to govern all meetings.

Sec. 6. Public Participation at meetings will be limited to the Introduction of Guests portion of the meeting unless the board requests information from an outside source.

Article III — Order Of Business

SECTION 1. The regular order of business at board meetings shall be as follows:

Roll Call

Introduction of Guests

Reading and approval or adoption of minutes

Financial Report and Outstanding Bills

Reports of Committees

Reports of Officers

Unfinished Business

New Business

Appointments

Adjournment

SEC. 2. The order of business may be temporarily suspended at any meeting upon a majority vote of a quorum present.

Article IV — Duties of Officers

SECTION 1. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society and of the Board, appoint committees and department heads, see that the Constitution, By-Laws and Rules are carried out and perform such other duties as are unusually incumbent upon such officer and as are approved or determined by the Board.

SEC. 2. The 1st and 2nd Vice Presidents, respectively, shall assume all of the duties of the President in the event of his absence, disability or vacancy of office and to perform such other duties as are determined by the Board.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall, in addition to performing acts required of him/her by this Constitution and by-laws or rules of the state:

- (Å) keep all minutes of the Society, board, or committees thereof; and recap and read minutes of meeting before adjournment.
- (B) keep complete and accurate records of all proceedings, transactions in which the Society or Board, or Fair is concerned or involved in any way;

- (C) prepare such reports as may be required by the board or the State of Ohio.
- (D) perform such other duties as required by board, as are usually incumbent on such officer, or as determined by the board.
- SEC. 4. The Treasurer shall, or person under the supervision of the treasurer, shall collect, account for, record, deposit and disburse all funds of the society. In addition to performing acts required of him/her by ORC 1711.071 in addition to performing acts required of him/her by this Constitution and by-laws shall:
- (A) collect or receive all funds due the society, and deposit same in depository as set up by the board; and to give, or take receipts for each such transaction.
- (B) keep accurate records of all receipts and deposits of the society on approved forms.
- (C) draw and issue orders on the proper depository and account of the Society, for payment of all premiums, bills or other accounts payable as approved by the board; keep accurate records of the expenditures on approved forms in such a way as to show to whom, and for what purpose the payment was made. (See Article 10, Section 2, Constitution.)
- (D) treasurer should balance with the bank quarterly, October 1, January 1, April 1, and August 1.
- (E) borrow money, and issue notes by order of the board.

Article V — Rules

SECTION 1. The Board may adopt whatever rules are needed for the conduct of the Society and of the fair.

Article VI -Filing Requirements of Directors

Section 1. Members of the Society must declare their candidacy for the office of Director of the Society by filing with the Secretary of the Society. The petition shall state current address, the specific board position for which the candidate is seeking to be elected, and signed by the candidate before it is circulated. Any person desiring to run for a position must actually reside in the District he or she has declared their candidacy for. A petition signed by ten or more members of the Society who are residents of Wood County at least seven days before the annual election is held. Only candidates who have met the filing requirements will be eligible for election as a Director.

Section 2. Any qualified member seeking to become a director or a current member seeking to be reelected as a director must submit a current completed Ohio BCI background check directly from the BCI, at their expense, prior to the deadline for petition submission. The BCI background check must indicate that the member is in compliance with O.R.C 109.572 (a)(1) Criminal records check.

Section 3. Any person applying to be appointed to an open position on the board must submit a written letter of intent to the board office that shall state current address, the specific board position for which the candidate is seeking to be appointed, and be signed by the candidate instead of having a signed petition. All candidates must be WCAS members, must reside in the district they are applying to represent and must be eligible to be elected for the position if they chose to be placed on the ballot to fulfill the unexpired term.

Article VII - Committee Policies

Sec 1. Directors are responsible for selecting standing committees that they are interested in participating in, at the annual restructuring meeting each year.

Section 2. Based on those interests and the needs of the Society, the Executive Team will appoint the members of the standing committees and chairman.

Section 3. It is the responsibility of the committee chairperson to call all committee meetings, submit the budget for each committee, keep minutes of all committee meetings, report all recommendations of the committee to the board of directors. If the committee chairperson fails to do their required functions they can be removed from that position by the executive committee. Section 4. The function of a standing committee is to plan activities on behalf of the board or research solutions to issues that the board may be facing. Once the committee has created a plan or found a solution to an issue they are to bring their recommendations to the board as a whole for approval. This would include, but is not limited to, changes in rules, premiums, activities, and purchases. Standing committees do not have the power to act, except in instances where the power is specifically delegated to those committees, for certain projects.

Section 5. Once activities and funding is approved by the Board of Directors, the committees will handle the operation of intended activities and act within their approved budget.

Section 6. Special or Ad Hoc committees may be appointed at the discretion of board of directors and may be treated with same rules as a standing committee or may be given the power to act, but the power to act must be established when the committee is created.
